Obituary.

MRS. BRIDGET JACKMAN, WIDOW LATE CAPT. WM. JACKMAN.
(H. F. SHORTIS.)

The people of the whole country will learn with deep regret the passing of a well-known venerable lady Mrs. Bridget Jackman, widow of the famous sea-fighter and master-marine, Capt. Wm. Jackman, who predeceased her forty-two years ago (Feb. 25th, 1877).

Mrs. Jackman was born in St. John's 81 years ago, and was the daughter of Mr. Samuel Burbridge, an English gentleman, who for many years was the faithful and trusted storekeeper in the employ of the late J. and W. Boyd of St. John's, whose premises are now occupied by the enterprising and popular firm of Alan Goodridge & Sons.

For some time past the deceased lady had been in a delicate state of health, and for some months she had been confined entirely to her room. During her tedious illness she was a constant example to those around her of resignation and patient faith in the designs of Divine Providence, in that she ever displayed a beautiful submission to, and a cheerful compliance with the trials so inevitably characteristic of a prolonged and somewhat painful illness.

She was a woman of sterling character, devoted to her home, her children and her church, of which she was a most constant and exemplary member, being a leading member of various Societies for many years. Like her famous and heroic husband, she was a friend and neighbour to be valued for real worth, and her charity towards the poor, and needy, was most extensive and unostentatious. Although having reached beyond the allotted span of years upon earth, she has left a vacant place that none other can fill. She has passed to the reward of a devoted life, fortified by all the rites of the Catholic Church. Being kind-hearted and courteous, she won the respect of all who came in contact with her. And thus has passed away another landmark of the glorious past of our country. To a cheerful and deeply religious disposition, she added the practice of thrift and instilled these qualities into the minds of her children. As I said before, she was known for her charity, though she wished it to remain unknown.

Mrs. Jackman was the mother of six children, viz—Late Rev. Wm. Jackman, for several years of the Cathedral, St. John's; James, of Bowring Brothers, Ltd., and two others who died very young, leaving Mrs. James J. Maher, of Garrison Hill, with whom she resided for several years; Thos. J. Chief Clerk in the Statistical Office, E. M. Customs; seventeen grand-children, and hosts of friends, to mourn their sad loss, in which the Evening Telegram respectfully and sincerely extends to them its heartfelt sympathy. Reunited in peace.

The Thin Red Line.

On October 25, 1854, thirty thousand Russians approached the Allied positions near Sebastopol, attacking some redoubts held by Turks, who at once hastened to seek safety in flight. A large force of Russian cavalry, moving in the direction of Balaklava, came in view of the 88th Highlanders, in a two-deep line. Their Brigadier—Sir Colin Campbell—knowing the quality of his men, did not think it "worth while" to form square, and the Highlanders justified his confidence. They waited until the charging mass came within 150 yards, and then poured in a fire which emptied many saddles, and caused the Russians to retreat in haste. Our Heavy Cavalry Brigade, under General Scarlett, stood some distance away, watching their opportunity. A strong body of Russian cavalry advanced, but as they came near, they paused and reined in to observe. Our trumpets rang out, and the gallant Heavy Brigade rode at and through their enemies, trampled them down, chasing them away in hopeless rout—five minutes sufficed for our magnificent cavalry to defeat the more numerous force of Russians. After these reverses, the Russians drew back, and took up a position about a mile and a half from the Allies, covered from attack by thirty guns. Up to now our Light Cavalry Brigade, under Lord Cardigan, had not been engaged. Lord Lucan—the commander of the Cavalry Division—now received, by the hand of Captain Nolan, a written order to advance nearer to the enemy. On reading it, Lord Lucan asked its bearer how far they were to advance, and received a reply which he construed, with fatal

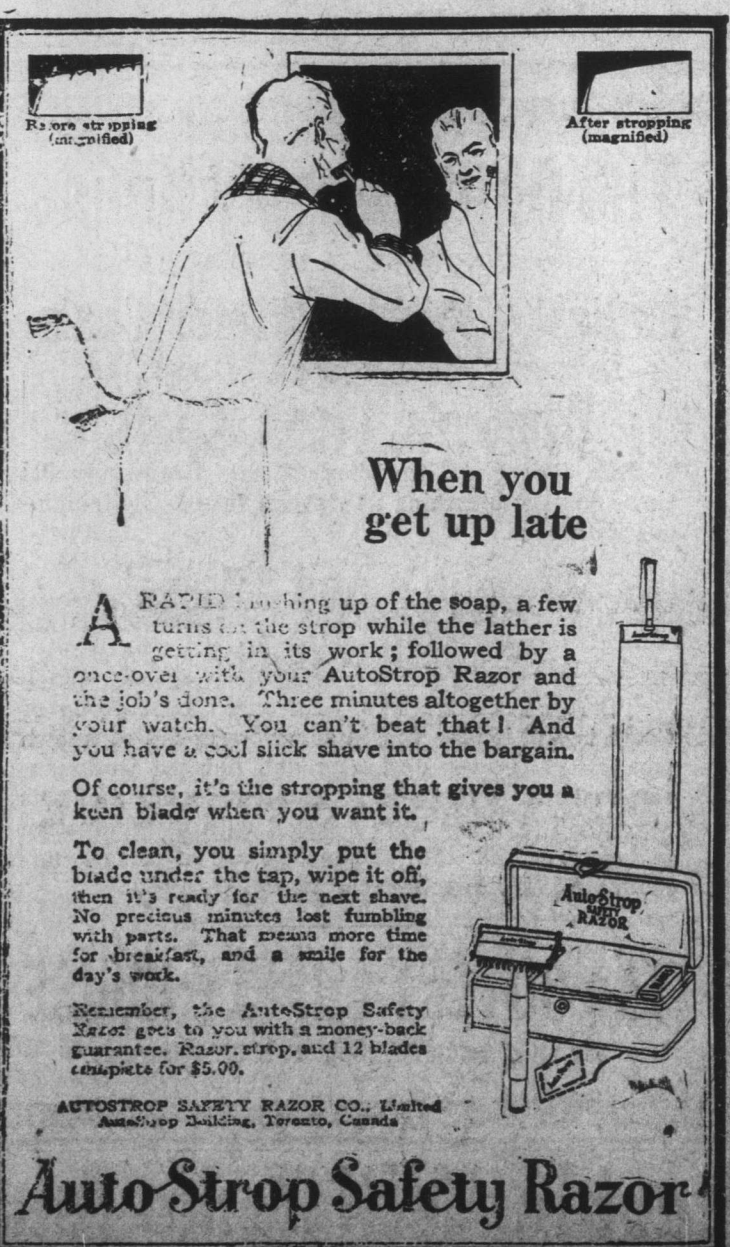
