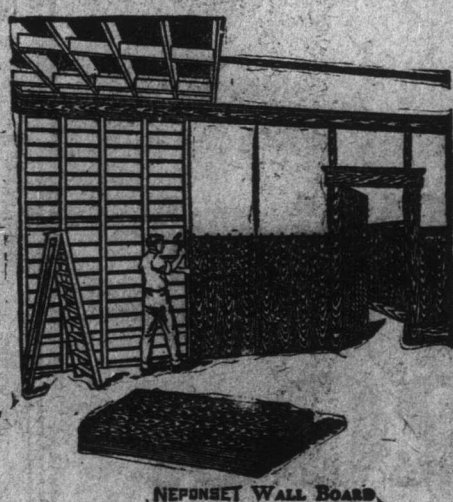

FINAL MEETING AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

MORNING.

The Friday morning session opened at 10 o'clock with devotional exercises conducted by Mrs. Lavell. There was a good attendance, and many of the ladies spoke of the help and inspiration received at the convention. Business was transacted, and a quiet half-hour followed, led by Rev. E. G. Barr, M.A. of St. Thomas's Church. After singing and prayer, Mr. Barr addressed the gathering, and gave a message that he once gave to a battalion of 5,000 men in France before going over the top, the story of the love of Jesus. There are certain duties devolving upon us as Christians, and if we neglect them, we have not the true missionary spirit. There is no need for me to say this here, as your presence at this convention, your work and your achievements denote that missions are part of your heart and life. I want to remind you that we have duties in life to perform but duty becomes delight when we have once seen the face of Jesus. It brings us to the point where we find it better to give than to receive. It is the doctrine of the second mile. Jesus said "If a man ask you to go a mile, go with him twain." There is a higher law than duty in life, a higher law than compulsion. It should be our pleasure to say with the Psalmist: "I delight to do Thy will, O God." There is nothing that can take God's love from us. It is on our part that love is transitory. A story is told of a famous artist, who painted a picture of the Lord's Supper. In looking at it he remarked: "What a beautiful chalice Jesus is holding in His hand." The painter did not say a word but went and painted it out. He turned round and said: "I want nothing to be seen in this picture, save the face of Jesus." When blind Bartimaeus received his sight, the first thing he saw was the face of Jesus. When you really get a glimpse of that face it easily becomes the first thing. We are ready enough to take our troubles to God, but how often do we take our joys? It is not so much success in our missionary work that counts, but faithfulness. God will not say: "Well done, good and successful servant," but "Well done, good and faithful servant." Let me pass on to you the message that I gave to the children a few days ago the secret of joy. This should be the secret of every heart. J—O—Y. Jesus first. Others second. Yourself last. A short prayer followed this address and the morning session closed with the hymn: "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name."

AFTERNOON.

At one o'clock an excellent lunch was served by the ladies of Gover Street in the Lecture Room of the Church. The afternoon session opened with devotional exercises. A memorial service was held for the members who died during the year. The Misses Moore and Bishop sang a duet—"There shall be Light at Eventide." Mrs. Lavell then conducted the consecration service. Entire consecration is the keynote of success in the Christian life. Unless we consecrate our lives entirely to the Lord there is sure to be something lacking. We cannot see what is best nor know what is best, but we can trust God to see for us. So it is fitting before we close that we should reconsecrate ourselves to the work. "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith." Through faith we can triumph over all our difficulties. Mrs. Lavell then read a few verses from Mat. 18, the story of the woman of Canaan whose daughter was grievously vexed with a devil, and who came to Jesus because she had heard of His wonderful healing power. She told her story, but Jesus answered her not a word. This was her first disappointment and test of her faith. Then the disciples came and said to Jesus: "Send her away." This was a second test of her faith. Jesus then said, "I am grieved but unto the lost sheep of the house of Israel." Even this, but she did not daunt the woman, for she came and worshipped Him, saying, "Lord help me." Jesus answered and said: "It is not meet to take the children's bread and cast it to dogs." Her answer was, "Truth, Lord, yet the dog eat of the crumbs that fall from the master's table." Then Jesus answered and said: "O woman, great is thy faith." He then sent her away with her daughter, and her daughter was made whole from that hour. This address by the Rev. J. W. Winsor was then taken up. It was decided to send to Mrs. Ross, ex-President of the Board of Managers thanks for her kind message sent through Mrs. Lavell to the Convention. This brought the convention to a close. 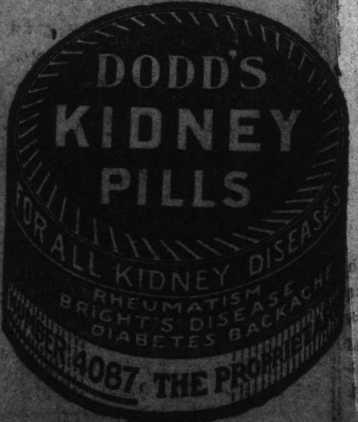
