Having restored foreign Telegraph Connection with
the Commercial Cable Company, Telegrams for all
parts of the world will be accepted at all our offices at
present published rates.

The normal route will now be operated instantly
from St. John's via Port aux Basques to Canso, Nova
Scotia, with an alternative route by Commercial Cables
from St. John's direct to New York, in case of inter-
ruption to the Newfoundland lines or Port aux Basques
cable.

By above connection the Newfoundland revenue
benefits at the rate of five cents per word, being one-
fifth of the 25 cent rate between Newfoundland and
Great Britain, and at the rate of three cents per word
between Newfoundland and Canada and the United
States of America.

Regatta Deadlock.

The Boat Clubs' Extraordinary De-
mands Precipitate Heated Dis-
cussion—Committee Adjourns
Indefinitely.

Unless boats can be obtained else-
where than from the C.L.B.C. Old Com-
rades and C.C.C. Boat Clubs, it is
unlikely that the Regatta will be held
this year.

After a heated discussion at their
meeting last night of the extraordi-
nary demands made by the Boat Clubs
with respect to sweepstakes, the Re-
gatta Committee adjourned indefini-
tely.

The Telegram learns to-day that Mr.
J. L. Noonan, the veteran secretary,
Mr. F. W. Hayward and other promi-
nent members of the Committee have
expressed their dissatisfaction with
the situation by tendering their re-
signations.

THE RESOLUTIONS.

The resolutions which are the cause
of the deadlock, now existing, are as
follows:

At the joint meeting of the C.L.B.C.
O.C. BOAT CLUB and the C.C.C.
BOAT CLUB held this date the fol-
lowing resolutions were passed:

RESOLVED—That in the opinion
of the C.L.B.C.O.C. and C.C.C. Boat
Clubs that in view of a Society sweep-
stake now selling in the city and other
clubs and societies contemplating
sweepstakes on the Regatta that we
cannot see our way clear to compete
against these Clubs and Societies.

FURTHER RESOLVED—That in
view of this fact we the C.L.B.C.O.C.
and C.C.C. Boat Clubs jointly decide
to take no part in the 1922 Regatta
unless these clubs and societies with-
draw their sweepstakes.

AN AWKWARD POSITION.

These resolutions were read by
President Hiccock who then expressed
the surprise that their receipt had

caused him. He had received a pro-
mise from Judge Morris that only the
two Boat Clubs would be permitted
to have wheels of fortune on the race
course. He had reported this to the
Committee and complete satisfaction
had apparently been felt. Until Mon-
day last, he had not been aware that
sweepstakes had been issued by cer-
tain fraternal organizations. The
Regatta Committee, through the action
of the Boat Clubs, was placed in an
awkward position. The public was
greatly surprised and disappointed,
and objected to such concessions to
the Boat Clubs.

OUTSIDE THEIR CONTROL.

Mr. W. J. Higgins, K.C., M.H.A.,
President of the Committee, explain-
ed the exact situation. There would
be no Regatta if the Boat Clubs fail-
ed to take part. He could not see
what the Regatta Committee had got
to do with the matter. They had as-
sisted the Boat Clubs to the limit of
their jurisdiction, by obtaining for
them the use of the green for wheels
of fortune. So far as sweepstakes
were concerned, it was a matter over
which the Committee had no control.
The solution lay with the public, who,
if in sympathy with the Boat Clubs,
would buy only their sweepstakes.
It was up to the people to make it
valuable for other organizations to
have sweepstakes. The Regatta Com-
mittee was asked to do something en-
tirely beyond their province. Mr. J. P.
Crotty agreed with Mr. Higgins. He
thought it necessary to find out if the
boats would be placed on the pond.
If the Boat Clubs had a grievance, it
was certainly not with the Regatta
Committee.

A WRONG IMPRESSION.

Several members of the Boat Clubs
present, declared that they had been
given the impression that the wheel
of fortune concession included
sweepstakes. Mr. Crotty explained
that what had actually been said was
that it was unlikely outside organiza-
tions would issue sweepstakes when
the Boat Clubs had the wheel of for-
tune concessions. Hon. F. Mac-
Namara suggested that the outside
organizations which have sweepstakes
should be asked to withdraw them.
Mr. Wight of the C.L.B.C.O.C. Boat
Club said there was no grievance with
the Regatta Committee. He said his
club was in a bad condition finan-
cially. If they consented to place their
boats on the pond would the Commit-
tee guarantee their losses, if any, on
sweepstakes. Mr. J. L. Noonan ex-
pressed his indignation at this extra-
ordinary request. The whole affair
was ridiculous. It was most un-
sportsmanlike and he was disgusted
with it.

SHOULD PROTECT CLUBS.

Mr. P. F. Collins, President of the
C.C.C. Boat Club, said it was up to
the Committee to protect the Boat
Clubs. Mr. J. Meenan complained of
the fact that while the Boat Clubs
wanted assistance, they would give
no information. Some further dis-
cussion took place and the informa-
tion was learned that the Boat Clubs
objected to sweepstakes altogether, but
in particular to a certain one which was
on the market and which they said,
competed unfairly with them. Presi-
dent Chaffé of the C.L.B.C.O.C. Boat
Club said they were not going to go
deeper into the hole and might just
as well give up this year as next
year.

Mr. Meenan—"Will you rent your
boats?"

The answer from the Boat Club re-
presentatives was a decided negative.
They also refused to loan them to the
Committee. Asked if they would sell,
Mr. Collins said they might, and went
further by stating that they were not
out for making money and they had
been unfairly treated by members of
the Committee.

Mr. Higgins pointed out that they
were arguing in a circle.

Mr. Ruby suggested that the Boat
Clubs should be requested to meet
again to further consider the matter.
The meeting adjourned indefinitely
with the proviso that if the Boat Clubs
desired to further discuss the situa-
tion, the Committee would be called
together to hear their new propo-
sitions.

MORE RESOLUTIONS.

A meeting of the Boat Clubs was
afterwards held and the following re-
solutions were drawn up. These do
not improve upon the situation, as it
is very improbable that outside or-
ganizations will withdraw their
sweepstakes, nor is it likely that the Boat
Clubs will be financed.

Obituary.

LAWRENCE PARKER.

Last night at his residence, Garri-
son Hill, there passed to the great
beyond the soul of a well known citi-
zen, Mr. Lawrence Parker. Mr. Par-
ker born in Feb. 1845 was the second
son of the late William Parker, who
conducted a mercantile business on
Water St. East., on the site of the
present premises of Colin Campbell,
Ltd. On leaving school he entered
the employ of the late John Hogsett,
who conducted a flourishing establish-
ment on Water Street, West. A few
years later he joined his eldest brother,
the late William Parker, and up to
the time of the bank crash in 1894
conducted a successful hardware busi-
ness. After the winding-up of the
firm, Mr. Parker opened an office as a
broker, and from then until a few
days of his death he was a familiar
figure along the street energetically
pushing business. His cheerful, gen-
eral manner won him a host of friends
and the good will of the business com-
munity. There survive him, his wife,
formerly Miss Furlong, a member of
a family also at one time prominent
along Water Street, one daughter, and
his younger brother, Mr. J. Parker,
senior partner of Parker & Monroe
Ltd. The funeral takes place to-mor-
row at 2.30 p.m.
