Historical Records

(H. F. SHORTIS.)
Article III.

In my last article I showed where Gossie, Pack & Fryer, of Carbonear, had agreed to meet the strikers, but the feeling among the men must have run very high in Harbor Grace.

On Monday morning at 2 o'clock, on February 20th, the schooner "Perseverance," as she lay at the wharf of Messrs. Ridley & Sons, was boarded by a crowd of men who chopped and looted her in such a manner as to leave her unfit to go to the fishery. It is said that one hundred men were in the gang. Her spars were chopped half through. It was all done in ten minutes, and the crowd moved off over the ice to the beach, but did not touch another vessel, although there were several in the vicinity.

The President of the Council (Government) in St. John's at once offered a reward of £100 (four hundred dollars) for the conviction of the offenders.

There is no mention of how this strike ended, but it shows the lawless manner of these men destroying property like this at midnight. There must have been some special grudge against the Captain of this vessel, as no damage was done to the others.

STORMY WEATHER.

The winter of 1831-32 must have been very stormy on the Atlantic, and the little brig had a hard time getting to the westward. The Colonial brig "Fortie," Capt. Buchan, arrived at St. John's, 54 days from the Isle of Wight. The brig "Cessrock," Capt. Thomson, put into Galway, Ireland, after being 53 days trying to get to Newfoundland. The brig "Indian Lass," Capt. Stubb, arrived at Brigus January 27th, after being 87 days on the ocean. She was badly broken up. One man was washed overboard and another badly frostbitten. The rest of the crew were unable to stand with the exception of the captain, the mate and one seaman.

On 26th November she spoke the "Caroline Gyles," of Carbonear, who wished to be reported. The "Caroline Gyles" was forced back to England, and did not arrive till the Spring.

June 30th.—The brig "Guysborough," Capt. Bennett, arrived at Cupids, 53 days from Oporto, Portugal.

The schooner "Henrietta," Capt. Smith, arrived at Cupids May 2nd, from Limerick, Ireland, with supplies that had been laden in St. John's the past Fall. This vessel had been driven off when rounding Cape St. Francis, and eventually arrived at Limerick, in Ireland, where she was refitted, and brought her cargo safely to Cupids after an absence of six months, and twice crossing the Atlantic.

The President of the Council in St. John's announced that the Colonial brig "Fortie" will be despatched for England about the 1st of Feb., and she will take home the convict whose sentence for a capital crime has been mercifully commuted to transportation for life to Van Dieman's Land.

There is no mention of this man's name, or what he had done, but the Government were certainly sending him far enough away.

Peculiar Facts and Figures

It was not until 1889 that George Eastman succeeded in making celluloid photographic film practicable, thus paving the way for present-day amateur photography and motion pictures. The making of photographic film has expanded by leaps and bounds, until to-day the leading film manufacturing plant produces 65,000,000 feet of motion picture film a month, or, roughly, 150,000 miles a year. Into the manufacture of this and other film goes nearly 5,000,000 pounds of cotton per year, and into the sensitizing over three tons of pure silver every week.

The United States possesses the Shenandoah, the largest rigid airship in active operation. The ZR-3, just completed, is even larger, with a capacity of 2,472,000 cubic feet of gas. And now comes the announcement that the British Government in lending the assistance of the Treasury to a private company, which is to build two ships for service to India, each of which is to be over double the size of the ZR-3, and have a gas capacity of 5,000,000 cubic feet.

During the Scottish herring season the Buckle fleet of 300 steam-driers and motor boats earned 275,000 pounds. The steam-driers' earnings averaged about 1,000 pounds, and the motor boats' 600 pounds; their expenses averaging 50 pounds and 30 pounds a week respectively.

A firm in Singapore has put on the market a rubber compound which, when softened by heat and spread on a board, will, like birdlime, snare any unwary bird, beast, or insect that crosses it.

The world's longest tunnel—a bore eighteen miles long through the Catskill Mountains, New York State—was made electrically. Electricity furnished the whole of the power for the mechanical work.

Fate of Wembley

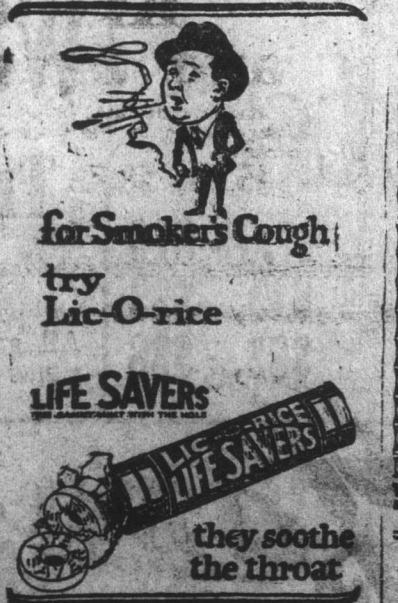
VALUABLE EXHIBITS TO BE SOLD

London's greatest bargain sale will take place shortly now that the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley has closed. Even if it re-opens next year it is calculated that there will be between £2,000,000 and £3,000,000 worth of goods to be sold, as practically all the exhibits will have to be changed. The treasures that have been assembled from all parts of the Empire will not, however, come under the hammer in the ordinary way. A syndicate has been floated under the title of the Wembley Exhibition Disposals Syndicate, Ltd., to dispose of exhibits by private treaty. "The object of the syndicate," explained Mr. Thomas Levy, the chairman, "is to prevent the sale of exhibits at 'slaughter' prices. After nearly all the great exhibitions in the past, exhibits have been sold at the most ridiculous prices. We intend to avoid all that. Manufacturers have naturally put their best work into these things, and we are going to watch the price. I would like to emphasize that there will be no essential bulk disposal. Anybody will be able to tender for a single article that has taken his fancy and obtain it, too, if his price is reasonable." Oddments left over after sales by treaty have been finished will be sold by public auction, possibly in the Civic Hall. The dismantling of the Exhibition is expected to take two and a half months at least. "12,000 men were engaged in bringing the exhibits to Wembley, and it is calculated that about 10,000 will be needed to take them out," declared an official of the department of the controller of Transport and Grounds. Mr. Barrington Hooper, the director of publicity to the Exhibition, states that unless a decision to continue is announced soon it may be understood that Wembley will close for good on November 1st.

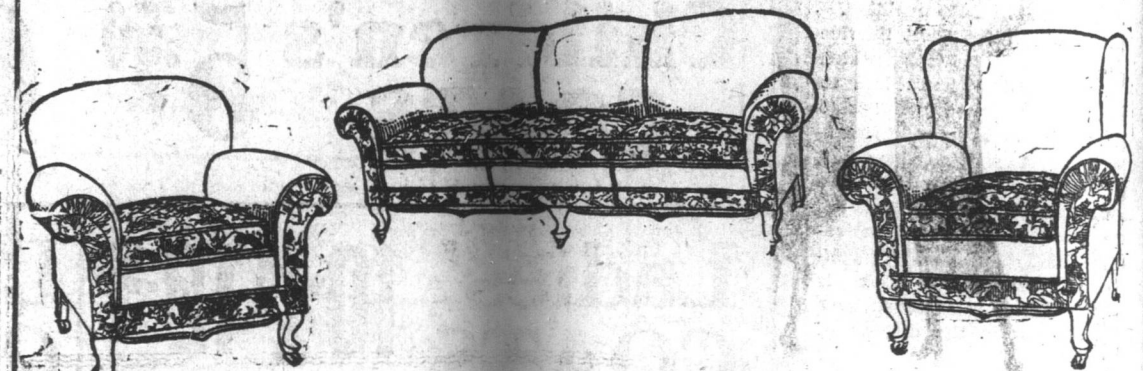
