Local and Other Items.

DEATH OF CHIEF JUSTICE CHASE.—Chief Justice Chase was on Tuesday attacked by apoplexy, from the effects of which he died on Wednesday, May 7th.

MAN KILLED BY A TRAIN.—An emigrant named John Cronin was killed at the Curie road crossing of the Canada Southern Railway, on Tuesday, May 6th.

THE INSOLVENCY LAW. The Insolvency Act now on the statute book expires this year. In the Dominion Parliament Sir John A. Macdonald called the attention of the Committee of the House on Expiring Bills to the fact.

NEARLY AN ACCIDENT.—A narrow escape from a repetition of the steam shovel cut disaster occurred on the Port Stanley branch of the Great Western Railway on Wednesday.

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TMS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

Railway Accident. Affairs in Spain. Attempted Assassination. Fighting at St. Martinsville. Capture of Tallfoo. Cable Opened. Fatal Accident. Funeral of Chief Justice Chase. Condition of the Pope. Sir Bartle Frere Coming Home. Strike in Dublin.

Vienna, May 7.—A despatch from Pesth brings intelligence of a shocking railway accident near that city. Twenty-one persons are reported to have been killed outright, and forty injured.

Madrid, May 7.—The band of Carlisis commanded by Don Alphonso, is surrounded by Republicans near Igalada, a town thirty-three miles north-west of Barcelona.

New Orleans, May 7.—The excitement prevailing throughout the city was increased this evening by the report that Kellogg had been shot.

London, May 7.—A despatch from Shanghai announces the capture by the Imperialists of that city, of Tallfoo, the telegraphic communication between Portugal and Madeira will be opened by cable in July.

New York, May 7.—Negotiations are in progress for the absorption of the Pacific and Atlantic telegraph line by the Western Union Company.

London, May 7.—A despatch from Bombay says Sir Bartle Frere will return to England immediately.

London, May 7.—A strike of the policemen in Dublin is imminent.
