THE GREAT GALE.

Destruction at Cape Breton.

Despatches received from Sydney, C.B., say that a terrible storm of wind and rain had been raging there since Monday, the greatest known in Cape Breton for years. All the harbours are filled with vessels. Thirty vessels were driven ashore in Sydney. The loss to farmers is heavy; many buildings are blown down, and the crops throughout the country devastated; bridges have been washed away and destroyed. The storm commenced at 12 noon, blowing fiercely from the south-east, barometer 29.5; the wind changed suddenly to the east, sending a heavy sea of ten feet sweeping in towards the docks and wharves, the wind blowing with frightful fierceness. Nine vessels are total wrecks. There were 50 sail of vessels in Cow Bay, and all of these, with the exception of the steamers, are ashore. The **Cunard** ss. "Alpha," from Sydney, put in there for a harbour, and with steam up and anchors down she succeeded in holding on. The breakwater at Cow Bay is badly damaged, and Belloni's wharf is destroyed. The destruction to shipping in the Bay is frightful. There is great excitement in Halifax over the accounts from Cape Breton.

Along the western coast of Nova Scotia the gale was severely felt. At Kitch Harbour a store was blown down and a schooner driven ashore. A number of fishing boats were wrecked at Portuguese Cove, and at Island Cove there were several collisions of vessels being there, and much damage was done to fishing boats, and wharves were driven ashore and smashed at Herring Cove. Along the Gulf shore the ravages of the gale were severe. Wharves were very much shaken and injured, and the destruction of stores and dwellings near the wharves was great. Trees were blown down in all directions, and it is feared the crops will be badly damaged. At Wallace Bridge a store was blown in and the goods carried out on the street. Several wharves in Bedford Basin were destroyed, and the tents of the military at Bedford Basin Range were blown down. The steamer "Alhambra," from Boston, encountered the storm in all its fury, crossing the Bay of Fundy. A schooner drove past her within a few feet near, only just escaping striking her.
