Madrid, Nov. 1.-Marshal Bianco, the new captain-general of Cuba, has arrived at Havana, and has taken over the command of that island from Captain-General Weyler, who retires. THE TRIBES "FULL OF ALARM." Simla, Nov. 1.—The Ameer of Atghanistan received a deputation of the Afridis and Orakzais at Cabul, his capital, on Oct. 17. In notifying the British agent at Cabul of the fact, he wrote that the tribes were "full of alarm and repentance," and had asked him to submit their apology to the British Government and to ascertain the conditions of pardon. He inquired of the agent whether negotiations were as they deserve every punishment." In concluding his letter to the British agent, the ancer warmly asserted his tion to the legation of the United "undeviating friendship for Great States, thus breaking off all relations

Britain." In a separate letter to Lord Elgin, the viceroy, the ameer says that he is trying to arrest the haddah mullah, and that if he succeeds he will expel the priest from Afghanistan. He also promises to prevent Afridis who take refuge in Afghanistan from interfering

Simla, Nov. 1.-According to a dispatch from Karappa the expected advance to the Arhangha Pass was made. Gen. Westmacott seized the villages covering the line of advance, and the artillery soon expelled the tribesmen from the Sangars. Only slight opposition was encountered. The crest was had wrought such fearful havoc, reached and the pass captured by Gen. Westmacott in two hours. The British sustained only trifling loss. Capt. Earl, of the Sikhs, was lightly wounded. The mullah of Saihakhar has fled to Jelalabad, and Sir Wm. Lockhart is now descending into the Afridi Tirah. The Arhangha Pass is thirteen miles from the Afghan frontier, at Safed-The comparatively easy capture of

Sempagha Pass was due to a maneuver of Gen. Lockhart, who feigned an attack upon the enemy's right, which was immediately reinforced by the commanders of the insurgent tribes-By so doing the chiefs weakened their center, and the British commander, acting with great quickness, threw the main column of his troops against the enemy's center. The tribesmen were thus taken by surprise, and their leaders did not have time to recall the forces sent to reinforce their right, and they were obliged to abandon their positions, as a hurricane of shells swept entrenchment after entrenchment, which were immediately occupied by the British troops. Only four British soldiers were killed and twenty wounded during the engagement.
