The Sultan Seared

By the Presence of British Warships.

Collapse of a Spinning Factory With Terrible Results.

More Christians Massacred by Turks—Labor Troubles in Scotland—Reducing Australian Salaries.

CUT DOWN HIS SALARY.

London, Oct. 10.—The bill reducing the salary of the Governor of South Australia from £5,000 to £4,000 has passed both Houses of Parliament.

THE CZAROWITZ DYING.

A special from Berlin says: Prof. Leyden has received a dispatch to the effect that the Czarowitz is growing rapidly worse. His condition is reported to be alarming.

THE AFRICAN BOOM.

London, Oct. 10.—The Earl of Dunmore has purchased a farm near Johannesburg, South Africa, for £35,000, and proposes building a large house and taking up his residence there. Lord Henry Paule is another British nobleman who has succumbed to the attractions of South Africa.

RUMORS FROM ROME.

London, Oct. 10.—It is stated at Rome that the Pope is strongly opposed to the proposed visit of the King of Portugal to Rome, and tried to dissuade the King from visiting the Italian capital. In Vatican circles it is said that the Pope will refuse to receive King Carlos, who is expected to arrive Oct. 17.

CHOLERA IN HAWAII.

London, Oct. 10.—A letter from Honolulu, dated Oct. 2, says the record of deaths from cholera to date is 87 cases. Sixty-three died, including only 10 white people. Eighty-two victims were Hawaiians. The natives persistently refuse to report cases until the victims were dead or dying. They declare that the cholera was brought about a month ago from the mainland. On Sept. 23 the whole town received a thorough cleaning.

But two new cases have been reported since that date. It is believed the trouble is now over. There is much distress among the Hawaiians. About 20,000 rations are given them weekly.

LABOR TROUBLES.

London, Oct. 10.—The Amalgamated Society of England has notified the Belfast shipbuilders and engineers that unless the demands of the society are conceded a strike will be commenced on Thursday. The employees state that there is no chance of bringing about a compromise in the matters in dispute. The Clyde shipbuilders, who are working under an understanding with those of Belfast, will, it is announced, suspend 25 per cent. of their men every week after the strike begins, and before the end of the month it is estimated that 5,000 men will be in idleness. A long and severe struggle between the members of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers and the shipbuilders and engineers is anticipated.

THE TURKO-ARMENIAN TROUBLE.

London, Oct. 10.—A dispatch from Constantinople says that massacres of Christians have occurred at Rodosto, in Roumelia, 40 miles west of Constantinople, and at Simid, in the same district, 50 miles southeast of Constantinople.

The Turks who took part in the rioting were armed. The few troops in the place made no attempt to stop the massacre, and it is even stated that they took part in the slaughter and pillage. The Sultan is much disturbed at the presence of the fleet at Lemnos, and has sent several messages to the British embassy describing the measures that have been taken to preserve order and praying that the ships be withdrawn.

It is now announced that the Porte has accepted the scheme with the modifications the powers declared were admissible. Nothing certain, however, is known. The dispatch adds that it is believed from a Turkish source that the six powers in their recent joint note demanded, besides the adoption of provisions for the public safety, the immunity of Armenians from further arrest and violence, and that a com-

mission of inquiry into the out-break be appointed, delegates for the powers sharing in the investigation. The dispatch further says that Russia has assured the Porte that although she has formally joined the powers in their demands, she does not intend to take extreme measures. Evidence accumulates that the action of the Powers and the Sultan was directed by officials. Turkish newspapers say the Sultan has ordered that several hundred sheep and a quantity of delicacies be given to the Sofas as a reward for their loyalty.

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK.

Copenhagen, Oct. 10.—The British steamer *Natier*, belonging to North Shields, bound from Cronstadt to Rotterdam, has been in collision, off the island of Aaland, with the British steamer *Livonia* of Leth. The latter vessel sank, and fourteen of her crew were drowned, in spite of the efforts of the *Natier's* crew, who, however, succeeded in rescuing ten men.

Sparks from the Wire.

An epidemic of typhoid fever and diphtheria is raging at Carberry, Man. It is said that Queen Victoria will confer the Order of the Garter upon the King of Portugal.

The Indianapolis Republicans suffered the heaviest defeat in the history of the city in the municipal election on Tuesday.

It is said that during the heavy blasting operations at Niagara about 50 planes have been more or less injured by falling rocks.

While two young men named House and Bowers were "fooling" with a knife, at New Germany, Ont., Bowers was accidentally stabbed and may not recover.

A heavy storm has been sweeping over Michigan peninsula since Monday. The wind shifted to the northwest and was accompanied by a dense snowfall.

At Christ Church Cathedral, Hamilton, on Tuesday, Miss Jessie Lefroy McInnes, only daughter of Senator Donald McInnes, was wedded to Archibald Hamilton Campbell, son of A. H. Campbell, Carbrooke, Toronto.

Frank Wright, the well known composer, of Toronto, who was engaged to sing at Newmarket Wednesday night, was found dead in a chair at his hotel in that place shortly before the concert commenced.

West Union, W. Va., Oct. 9.—A 2,400-barrel oil well came in today near West Union.

DR. TALMAGE IN WASHINGTON.

Washington, Oct. 10.—Dr. Talmage will be installed as co-pastor with Dr. Sanborn, and Rev. Mr. Allen about the 24th inst., and he will preach his initial sermon in that capacity Sunday evening, Oct. 27.

THE EPISCOPALIAN CONVENTION.

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 10.—The Episcopal House of Deputies have authorized a new diocese, that of Northern Michigan. The report of the committee recommending Boston as the next meeting place was taken up. An amendment recommending Atlanta was carried by a decisive vote.

THE CONGREGATIONALISTS.

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 10.—The triennial session of the National Council of the Congregational Churches of the United States opened a six days' session yesterday in the Plymouth Congregational Church. About 300 delegates were present at the call to order by Rev. Alonzo H. Quint, D.D., of Boston, Mass., moderator. Prof. Warriner of Montreal, Que., represents the Congregational Union of Canada. Representative Nelson Dingley, jun., of Lewiston, Me., was the only nominee for moderator, receiving 167 out of 182 votes.

SENT ON FOOLS' ERRANDS BY A PARROT.

Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 10.—A parrot belonging to an opera company, and which figures in one of the acts of the show, escaped from its keeper at the New York Central Railroad station this morning while the members of the company were waiting for a train. As the train pulled into the station and there was a rush for the gates, the parrot from the top of the big clock, sang out:

"Hello! You have forgotten something. Several people hurried back to their seats to look for satchels or parcels. As the passengers came in from the train house they were greeted with: "Hello, Harry! Hello, old boy."

At last one of the company joined in trying to catch the bird, but did not succeed for a long time, during which the parrot kept up its chatter. At last 25 people missed their trains, coming back to find remark that something had been forgotten.

The Denfield Tragedy.

Conclusion of the Inquest Upon John Layng.

Condition of Miss Robson Improving—Her Assault Broke Two of Her Corset Straps—Thirty Seven Cuts and One a Ruptured Stitches.

Alisa Craig, Oct. 10.—The condition of Miss Mabel Robson, who was so terribly assaulted and cut by her lover, John Layng, on Monday night, is somewhat improved today. Though still very weak from the heavy loss of blood Miss Robson is able to eat fairly well, although the operation of masticating her food is painful in the extreme. The girl now feels the nervous shock even more than she did shortly after the terrible affair. The force of her assailant's blow against her chest will be better imagined when it is known that he broke two of the steels of her corsets by the pressure. Thirty-seven distinct cuts were made by her assailant in his erratic fury, and it required over 100 stitches to sew them up. Layng's funeral was held yesterday. In the afternoon the coroner's jury met at Haskett's hotel, Saddle Lake, and rendered the customary verdict that deceased came to his death by a razor wound inflicted by his own hand, after a murderous attempt on the life of Miss Robson.

The jury was composed of the following neighbors: Messrs. J. B. Shipley, J. W. Siddall, Edwin Phillips, Wm. McLurg, Daniel Hughes, Joseph Haskett, Thos. Radcliffe, Edwin Crompton, Wm. McCubben, George M. Shipley, W. D. Robson and L. J. Shipley.

Mrs. H. W. Babcock, London, and Mrs. Egan, con. 5, London township, are sisters of Layng. Mrs. Marsh and Edward Layng, Denfield, are also sister and brother. Several other children are also scattered over the county. Michael Layng raised eleven children, but three are now dead.

Mr. Robson is not related to Mr. Thomas Robson, county clerk.

LAURIER AT PRESCOTT.

Powerful Address by the Liberal Leader, Hon. Geo. W. Ross and a Representative Manufacturer.

Prescott, Oct. 10.—The success of Tuesday at Morrisburg, where the Liberal leader opened his Ontario tour, was repeated at Prescott yesterday, where Mr. Laurier was received with the utmost enthusiasm and cordiality. When the train from the east arrived there was at the station a throng of citizens, including the leading Liberals of this district, to welcome the leader. And it was a genuine welcome that they gave him. After greetings had been exchanged, a procession, headed by the combined bands of Prescott and Prescott, was formed and escorted the visitors to the residence of Mr. J. P. Wiser. The meetings in the afternoon and evening were enthusiastic to a degree. The impression created by Mr. Laurier was one that reflected the greatest credit upon his attainments and sound political views. During the present tour of Mr. Laurier one meeting in addition to those already announced will be held. This meeting will be at Ingersoll on Friday or Saturday, Oct. 25 or 26.

Sir Richard Cartwright, Hon. Mr. Laurier and Mr. Geo. P. Graham, of the Young Men's Liberal Club of Prescott, Edwardsburg, Augusta and Cardinal, at which a powerful and convincing address was delivered by Hon. Geo. W. Ross, Mr. P. T. Foran, of Smith's Falls, the manufacturer, arranged the National Policy and pronounced it a flat failure, and the meeting closed with cheers for the Queen and Mr. Laurier.
