METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 17, 8 p.m.—The only pronounced high area shown by tonight's chart is that which still lies off the Atlantic coast, and there are some five or six shallow low areas over the continent. This varied distribution of pressure is accompanied by generally unsettled weather. A fairly heavy rain has fallen over Western Ontario, but as yet only a few scattered showers have occurred from Kingston eastward. Light snow is again reported at various points in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 48-52; Kamloops, 34-48; Edmonton, 14-25; Prince Albert, 20-28; Qu'Appelle, 15-25; Winnipeg, 30-38; Port Arthur, 35-50; Parry Sound, 52-53; Toronto, 51-67; Ottawa, 44-70; Montreal, 48-58; Quebec, 42-70; Halifax, 23-53.

Local temperatures—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Tuesday, Oct. 17, were 66.5 and 50 degrees.

Today sun rises at 6:36; sets at 5:31. Moon rises at 5:03 p.m.; sets at 6:13 a.m.

A LOCAL BUDGET

—Mr. James Colerick, of the firm of H. & C. Colerick, has returned from a business trip to New York.

—George Irvine, who resides on the Wortley road, South London, had three ribs broken on Saturday. He is an engineer at work on the waterworks dam, and fell against the stone crusher.

—Mr. Thomas Stone, one of Chatham's most prominent citizens, died early Tuesday morning. Deceased was the father of Mr. George E. Stone, Miss Margaret Stone, and Mrs. Charles T. Glass, of this city.

—A barber named Jones, who lives on Horton street, was last night near Engineer Findlay's house at Springbank. His hip was broken and he was bruised painfully. He was removed to his home.

—Toledo aldermen discovered that paving on Melrose avenue was not laid according to specifications, but had been pronounced O.K. by inspectors. It is now feared that the city had been robbed by wholesale and a huge paving scandal is brewing.

—The Hunt Club anticipate having a big field day at the kennels tomorrow. The president and Mrs. Gibbons have issued invitations to the members and their families to a luncheon at 1 o'clock. The hounds will throw off at 3 o'clock, and the run will be what is known as the Hyde Park run. Several visitors from Toronto and Hamilton are expected to participate.

—Harry O'Neill, son of Dr. J. D. O'Neill, of Talbot street, was thrown from his horse yesterday morning while riding with his sister, Miss Clara O'Neill, on Bathurst street, near Clarence. The horse reared and fell backwards on his rider, rendering him unconscious. A doctor was summoned, and the boy was soon able to return home. His injuries, though painful, are not considered serious.

—Detroit News: Sergt. Nash arrested George Oliver and John Harvey, of London, for trespassing on the G. T. R. Forty-one dollars in bills and about 20 counterfeit American nickels were found in their possession. The bills will be submitted to experts for examination. The men claim they got the nickels at a saloon in Toledo.

A United States marshal looked at the men today, but he had never seen either of them before.

—Miss E. M. Harris, who has held a responsible position in the Bell Telephone Company's office, has lately resigned, and intends leaving on Thursday morning for Chicago, where her parents reside. On Saturday the employees presented her with a kindly worded address. Accompanying the address were two dozen solid silver tea and dessert spoons, with monogram. A SEARCH IN PROGRESS

Aldermen Hunting for Reasons for Apparent Discrepancies

In Cement Sidewalk Work—Contractor Graham Has Used \$1,500 Worth of Cement Less Than the Silica-Barytic Company Would Have Used—A Test.

The investigation committee plunged into work last night. Only two interested parties—the inspectors of cement sidewalks which have been laid north and south of Dundas street—were examined, but it was definitely established that the discrepancies set forth by Ald. Parnell in support of his motion in council to appoint an investigation committee existed. The result of the session was to decide that tests be made, at a time set by the engineer, of the areas covered by a barrel of cement according to the different methods used by the contractors for the laying of the walks, north and south of Dundas street. Archibald Graham is contractor for walks north of Dundas street and the Silica-Barytic Company for walks south of Dundas street.

The meeting opened at 8 p.m. There were present Ald. Parnell, Wilkey, Graham, Jony, Rumball and Winnett, and City Engineer Graydon, members of the committee, Ald. Douglas, a silent auditor, and Solicitor W. C. Fitzgerald.

Ald. Parnell, though entitled to the chairmanship as convener of the committee, moved that Ald. Winnett take the chair, as he had been asked to do so by those who came before the committee, and desired a free hand.

The motion was carried on being seconded by the mayor, and Ald. Winnett became presiding officer.

Ald. Parnell then explained his reason for making the motion in council. He had but one object in view—to right a wrong, if such existed. He was not chasing any contractor. The purpose of the committee was simply to consider apparent discrepancies, and compare the sidewalks laid by the different contractors. The letter sent by the engineer to the inspectors last August led the speaker to believe that there was something wrong. Aldermen and others had stated that some of the walks were not what they ought to be, and if they better tested and secured for the city's outlay the time spent by the city would not be wasted. In the speaker's efforts to get information on the matter every help the engineer's department could give had been given, he said. From reports on a number of blocks north of Dundas street, taken indiscriminately, Ald. Parnell had found that the average area covered by a barrel of cement was 58 square feet. On the south side the average in a similar number was 44 feet. The specifications called for one barrel of cement to two square feet and five of gravel for the foundation, and the top layer was to be one inch thick, in the proportion of one of cement to one of sand. Ald. Parnell wondered that such a large discrepancy should exist if the specifications were followed in both cases. The city engineer was frank enough, he said, to say that he could not explain why these discrepancies existed. His (the engineer's) personal opinion was that a barrel of cement should cover 55 square feet, but of this he was not positive. There had been some trouble early in the year with the workmen south of Dundas street, and the engineer decided that the cement and sand be measured thereafter. This was done on the south side only. The inspector on the north side satisfied the engineer that such measuring was not necessary there. The finish on the south side was much drier than on the north. Two walks were compared. In one on Dundas street, south side of Burwell to Colborne, 47 barrels of cement were used for 20,076 square feet, and on Richmond street, Hyman to Pall Mall, only 39½ barrels were used for 20,088 square feet. There was either too much being used in one case or too little in the other. The engineer was unable to account for these differences. If he had been able to explain why they existed the speaker would not have moved for the investigation. But it was a serious matter, as was shown by the totals. The Silica-Barytic Company had used 2,450 barrels of cement in laying

116,422 square feet of walk, or an average of 46.97 feet to the barrel.

A. Graham, who had the contract for the work north of Dundas street, had laid 188,120 square feet with 3,981 barrels, or an average of 55.33 square feet to the barrel. As the difference was about one-sixth on every barrel, Contractor Graham had pocketed \$1,500, which he should not have done if the specifications had been lived up to. But it was not so much the money they were to consider, but as to whether they were getting an inferior walk. He was not trying to fasten the blame on anyone. The committee had a right to know why these differences existed.

Mr. W. C. Fitzgerald told the committee that he was present in Mr. Graham's interest.

Ald. Parnell was surprised that Mr. Graham had retained a solicitor. No charges had been made against Mr. Graham.

Mr. Fitzgerald said it was pleasing to be retained as solicitor, no matter how light the work, and added that the matter was a very serious one for Mr. Graham's business.

The committee decided that Mr. Fitzgerald would not be allowed to cross-examine the witnesses, no charges having been made.

Mention was made of a walk south of Dundas street, on Burwell, which ran 67 feet to the barrel.

Inspector Frank Hayman, employed on the north side of Dundas street, was summoned. Questioned by Ald. Parnell, Mr. Hayman said the Silica-Barytic Company had lived up to the specifications.

Once he objected to too much sand being used on an Adelaide street walk, and since the ingredients had been measured. That had been going on since about half-way through the season's work. One barrel of cement should do from 45 to 47 square feet. Mr. Hayman said his only explanation with regard to the Burwell street walk was that a load of cement had been delivered without his knowledge. The loads consisted of from ten to eleven barrels.

Inspector William Taylor, of the Graham walks, was next called. The cement used on the north side came in bags, four to the barrel. It took a barrel and a quarter to do 100 feet. The Silica-Barytic Company put their finish on drier than Graham did, and one reason for the difference in figures was that the Barytic Company wasted enough cement to do 100 feet. His (Graham's) workmen put more sand in the cement if they were not watch-

DEATH OF

GEORGE J. GRIFFIN

He Never Relieved From the Attack of Apoplexy—An Active and Useful Life.

Mr. George J. Griffin, of 562 King street, city, died yesterday afternoon at Caledonia, N. Y., of apoplexy. The attack occurred Saturday morning, and he never regained consciousness. Mrs. Griffin and his son George were at the bedside when he died. The body was brought home this morning.

Mr. Griffin had been a resident of London for 44 years. He was a well-known and highly-esteemed citizen, and an energetic business man. He was born at Bristol, England, in 1850, and came to his city in 1895, where he resided almost continuously. He began his business career as a seedman with his father, the late James Griffin. Later he became manager for J. Pearce & Co., a position he held until he went into business for himself in 1931. Latterly he had been on the road for L. S. May & Co., of St. Paul, and it was while he was on a business trip he was stricken with apoplexy. Prior to that he was apparently in good health.

Mr. Griffin always took an active interest in municipal affairs, and served two terms as a member of the school board on No. 3 ward, of which he was chairman of No. 1 committee. In politics he was a staunch Liberal. He was a member of the Memorial Church. He was also a member of the Woodmen and Masonic fraternities.

The widow, four sons and six daughters survive. The sons are Robert, George and Garnet, of this city, and Gilbert, who is in the Southern States. The daughters all reside in this city, with the exception of Leona, who is in Port Huron. Joseph Griffin, of St. Thomas, is a brother of deceased. The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon from the family residence.

Representatives of the London Cold Storage Company waited on the board of water commissioners yesterday at the regular meeting, in reference to the charge being made for a water service at the company's warehouse. The deputation was composed of Messrs. T. H. Smallman, Dr. Niven, John Lawatt, W. J. Reid and Mr. Masurel. Mr. Smallman was spokesman. He and the other members of the company were surprised at the amount of the bill for the first quarter, amounting to \$539 55 gross, or \$422 14 net. Something must have been wrong, or the account would not be so large. He thought perhaps the meter was not working properly. No action will be taken by the board until after Superintendent Moore has reported on the matter.

Mr. A. E. Greer protested against the rates charged for the service at his factory. Superintendent Moore will report.

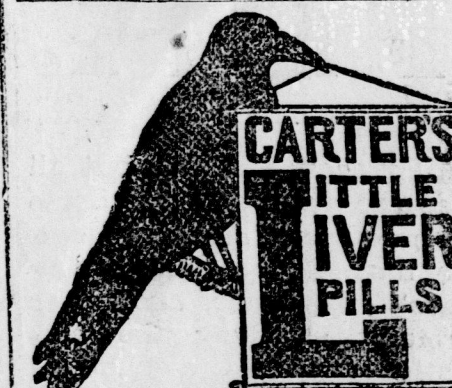
The agreement with the Byron school board for the education of the children living on the waterworks property was reported as having been signed. The board will receive \$55 a year.

The report of Superintendent Moore contained a number of recommendations. All were adopted. Water will be furnished in the telephone company's new building by meter at the usual rates, with a minimum of \$40 per year and meter rent. The residences of Messrs. F. E. Leonard and D. S. Ferrin, on Queen's avenue, will also be furnished by meter, with a minimum charge of \$30 per year and meter rates. The rate for Jonathan Ardill's house, on Rectory street, was reduced to \$5 a year, only three rooms being used for residential purposes. J. C. Allan will be held liable for \$5 damage done to a hydrant.
