JIMMY'S LUCK

Started for the Klondike on a Freight Train and Returned as a Millionaire in a Private Car.

New York, Oct. 15.—A special to the Herald says, Berkeley Springs, W. Va., Oct. 15.—Jimmy Adams has returned from the Klondike. When he left here three years ago he went with no money and on a freight train. He returned by a private car hauled by a leased locomotive, and brought with him nearly \$200,000 in gold, and papers representing mining possessions worth \$5,000,000, and prospectively worth ten times as much.

When he was back from the north two years ago, he had some gold and prospects, but he had not written home since, and no one was prepared for his return.

Detroit he tired of traveling in ordinary trains, and took the best and biggest car he could get at \$500 a day, coming leisurely and stopping at Niagara Falls and New York. When he got to Brunswick he leased a private car to come over the branch line to Berkeley Springs, arriving at the station without any one in town expecting him.

To European Women Going North From Hong Kong.

Situation in Yang Tse Valley Very Serious.

Rebels Capture Kiu Shan—40 Boxers Beheaded at Kiu Kow—Czar's Troops Seize the Kiu Chwang Railway.

Berlin, Oct. 15.—A dispatch received here from Shanghai says the British consular there warns European women against coming north from Hong Kong in the hope of joining their husbands, the situation in the Yang Tse Valley being very serious.

REBELS WIN. Hong Kong, Oct. 15.—Sun Yat Sen, according to reports from Canton, has taken the town of Kiu Shan, on East River, and is now investing the prefectural city of Hui Chou. A force of imperial troops from Canton was defeated by the reformers, 200 being killed. Its advisers say also that there is great activity in Canton in preparation for dispatching troops to the disturbed districts.

DR. MORRISON'S STORY. London, Oct. 15.—Dr. Morrison, in today's Times, concludes his dramatic description of the siege of Pekin. He expressed the deep obligation of all those confined in the British legation to the services of that city, and Frederick D. Gamewell, head of the Methodist mission board, to whom was due the designing and construction of all our defenses, and who carried out in the most admirable manner Sir Claude Macdonald's ideas and suggestions. He also refers to the "valuable services" rendered by Mr. Squires, secretary of the United States legation.

The Times, commenting editorially upon Dr. Morrison's narrative, says: "The whole story justifies in the fullest manner Emperor William's attitude toward the authors of the atrocities. It is a story of a reasonable demand for the responsibility of the high officials and the Tsung Li Yamen."

FORTY BOXERS BEHEADED.

London, Oct. 15.—The Standard publishes mail advices from Tien Tsin, giving a list of 54 documents that were seized in the yamen of the viceroys of the capture of that city, and fell into the hands of correspondents before the military authorities had seized the yamen. These include receipts for money paid to Boxer generals for supplies to their troops of every kind, reports of actions and lists of casualties and rewards paid to generals and the families of killed, all clearly proving that the authorities maintained the Boxer movement by lavish expenditure.

Forty more Boxers were beheaded at Hankow late in September. Hankow is under martial law.

LI AT PEKIN.

Pekin, Wednesday, Oct. 10.—Li Hung Chang has arrived at Tung Chow, escorted by Russian troops. It is expected that he will arrive here tomorrow.

[A previous dispatch from Peking of the same date as the above reported Li Hung Chang to have called on the legations.]

THE IMPERIAL COURT.

Paris, Oct. 15.—A dispatch received at the French foreign office from Hankow, dated Oct. 13, says the Chinese court arrived at Sian Puh Oct. 12.

RUSSIANS SEIZE A RAILWAY.

London, Oct. 15.—It is asserted, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Times, that the Russians have seized the North China Railway, at the terminus of the Shan Hai Kwan line. This is the first step the Russians have taken on the right bank of the Amur.

The Russian southern and northern armies have joined hands at Telling, north of Mukden, and are placing all of Manchuria east of the River Liao and a portion west of the stream in the hands of Russia.

APPEAL TO CZAR FROM CHINA.

The Associated Press learns that the Chinese minister to Russia, Yang Yu, who visited Emperor Nicholas yesterday, strongly appealed for the intercession of the czar in China's favor, and presented to him a letter from Emperor Kwang Su, together with documentary evidence tending to show that the Chinese ruler and his army are less to blame for the anti-foreign outbreak than the Russian emperor had been led to believe.

THE SHANGHAI LIAR.

Pekin, Sept. 11.—English and American papers just received make interesting reading for the ministers and army officials, telling, as they do, all about their supposed enemy, and giving tragic details as to how men killed their womenfolk, how members of some of the legations were boiled in oil, and other harrowing pictures of the last days of the siege. There is an individual in Shanghai, better known to the world as "The Shanghai Liar," who, if he were here, would probably meet a warm reception from some of his resuscitated victims.

BIG BATTLE IMPENDING.

If Sir Robert Hart shall prove a true prophet, there will be a serious affair before the beginning of November, when the numerous bands marching from the south will have come together, and be more or less under central control. There will probably be one battle, with great loss to the Chinese, before they realize the hopelessness of further resistance.

GERMANY'S ANSWER.

Berlin, Oct. 15.—The Berlin Neueste Nachrichten says it understands that Germany's answer to the note of M. Delcasse, French minister of foreign affairs, dated yesterday, today, that it is in a friendly tone, and it raises no objection to the principles enunciated by M. Delcasse. The paper does not assert that the reply deals with all his proposals.

Paris, Oct. 15.—Germany is the only power which has not replied formally to France's note on China, though she has verbally accepted its terms.

JAPAN'S REPLY.

Japan's answer, received today, accepts the proposals objecting to only one condition. This refers to the permanent prohibition of the importation of arms. While agreeing with the principle, Japan offers suggestions as to how the prohibition can be best accomplished.

SERIOUS RISING.

Hong Kong, Oct. 15.—A column of troops was dispatched this morning to the Kowloon frontier, with the object

of barring armed refugees, either rebels or imperial troops, from entering British territory when defeated.

The rebels are reported to be 3,000 strong, and north of the British frontier. A thousand of Admiral Hove's troops are in pursuit of them, while 2,000 Chinese troops have left Canton, overland, to intercept the rebels. All indications point to the rising being widespread. Apparently Kang Yu Wei, Sun Yat Sen and the Triads have amalgamated their forces in the common cause, the overthrow of Manchu rule in South China.

A French launch was captured by pirates on Oct. 13, near Mong Chow. The pirates secured \$32,000 in specie.
