His Intrepid Troopers Said to Have Entered the Town.

Gen. Rundle's Men Drive the Enemy Out of Senekal-On Sunday Roberts' Advance Force Was Only 77 Miles from Pretoria—The Main Body of the British Army is North of the Vaal.

#### ENEMY DRIVEN OUT.

Senekal, Sunday, May 27.—Gen. Rundle, with artillery, the yeomanry and the Walts, Middlesex and Leicester Regiments, under Major Dalbiac, has occupied Senekal, whence the Boers were driven by a few shells. A field cornet and a number of other Boers were killed. The British casualties numbered eleven. The Boers are believed to be concentrating near Bethlehem.

The Boer rear guard is at Moyerton, ten miles north of Vereeniging. Their main body is moving toward the Klip River hills, to the south side of Johannesburg.

#### Irresistible.

STEADY PROGRESS NORTHWARD. Grootvlei, 23 miles south of Vereeniging, Sunday, May 27.-Lord Roberts' northern advance force steadily continues, and today the Transvaal hills were sighted. Gen. French has secured an excellent flanking position on the northwest. There is something irresistible about this advance. The troops have been splendidly handled and the Boers, completely outmaneuvered, have been forced to abandon their positions at the first appearance of the British flanking force which has made a determined resistance at the Vaal impossible. Many Transvaal burghers are now trekking homeward, and it is safe to say that the most irreconcilable Transvaal officer at last recognizes the hopelessness of the struggle. #### HONORS TO THE DEAD.

Mafeking, May 27 .- The entire garrison paraded this morning to the thanksgiving service. Col. Baden-Powell addressed the men, saying: "We have been unable to fire a volley over the graves of our killed, being fearful of drawing the fire of the enemy's guns." Today the garrison paid the last honors to the dead, assembling in the graveyard, and bidding good-bye to their fallen comrades. After sounding the last post, the garrison attempted to sing the National Anthem, but could hardly be heard as the men choked with emotion. Col. Baden-Powell was deeply affected, and ad-dressed each unit separately. He told the town guard that those who wished would be permitted to return to their civilian avocations. To the Rhodesian column, in a characteristic manner, he said: "We've kicked out

the Boer protectorate." The Boers who were routed here rallied a few miles east of Polfontein. well within the British border. is no sign of the enemy to the north. Col. Plumer's linesmen have received a wire, saying that a train will arrive
