Gen. French at Johannesburg.

His Intrepid Troopers Said to Have Entered the Town.

Gen. Rundle's Men Drive the Enemy Out of Senekal—On Sunday Roberts' Advance Force Was Only 77 Miles from Pretoria—The Main Body of the British Army is North of the Vaal.

Cape Town, May 28.—It is rumored an excuse thus being given them for the destruction of property. The Transvaal Government will not dare destroy the mines or property without an excuse.

ENEMY DRIVEN OUT.

Senekal, Sunday, May 27.—Gen. Rundle, with artillery, the yeomanry and the Waits, Middlesex and Leicester Regiments, under Major Dalbia, has occupied Senekal, whence the Boers were driven by a few shells. A field cornet and a number of other Boers were killed. The British casualties numbered eleven. The Boers are believed to be concentrating near Bethlehem.

A BOER BASE OF SUPPLIES.

London, May 28.—Advices received here assert that supplies continue to go to the Boers from Lorenzo Marquez, and that foreign recruits for the Boer army proceed from the same point.

ROBERTS' ADVANCE.

London, Monday, May 28—3:20 p.m.—When Lord Roberts wrote his first dispatch on Transvaal territory yesterday (Sunday), shortly before 2 o'clock in the afternoon, he was 51 miles from Johannesburg and 77 from Pretoria. His immensely superior forces had passed the Vaal River, their last great natural obstacle, at three points. The Vaal forms a curve of 80 miles from Parys on the west to Zand Drift on the east. The concave of the curve is toward the Free State. Thus Lord Roberts, advancing along the railway, was in a position to strike any part of the crescent by shorter lines than those by which the Boers could reinforce the threatened points. The Boers retreated almost without a show of defense. Gen. French and Gen. Hamilton apparently did not fire a shot.

Of Lord Roberts' immediate force, 11,000 men, the 8th Mounted Infantry were the first to ford the river. They came upon a Boer patrol looting at Viljoens Drift, and a skirmishing, lasting ten minutes, followed. Two hundred Boers tried feebly to hold the river crossing, but they were dislodged. The Boer rear guard is at Moyerton, ten miles north of Vereeniging. Their main body is moving toward the Klip River hills, to the south side of Johannesburg.

PRETORIA. While Lord Roberts' 30,000 infantry, 20,000 horses and 150 guns are moving on Johannesburg, the 8th Mounted Infantry through a parched and deserted country, the situation at the Transvaal capital, as it was last Friday, is thus described by an observer, who sent his message by private hand to Lorenzo Marquez yesterday: "The situation, both from a military and political point of view, has become very critical. President Kruger admitted for the first time that matters are serious. The Boer determination to trust everything to the 8th Mounted Infantry on the Gatzrand mountains, to the north of Potchefstroom, where 3,000 Kaffirs are digging trenches. To that point every available man and gun has been sent. The wholo of the western border of the Transvaal from end to end is defenseless, and Gen. Baden-Powell can march in when he likes. Lord Roberts, on the other hand, will encounter the greatest resistance. The Boer commander will lure the British into appearing to threaten Johannesburg with attack.

Baden-Powell addressed the men, saying: "We have been unable to fire a volley over the graves of our killed, being fearful of drawing the fire of the enemy's guns." Today the garrison paid the last honors to the dead, assembling in the graveyard, and bidding good-bye to their fallen comrades. After sounding the last post, the garrison attempted to sing the National Anthem, but could hardly be heard as the men choked with emotion. Col.
