BAPTISTS JOIN IN CONVENTION

Young People From Ontario and Quebec Meet Here.

Good Friday a Day of Inspiration Despite Rain and Gloomy Weather—Their Officers.

Notwithstanding rain and general gloominess of weather, Good Friday was a day of gladness and inspiration to those who attended the annual convention of the Baptist Young People's Union of Ontario and Quebec, which was held yesterday in the Talbot Street Baptist Church. Three sessions were held, in the morning, afternoon and evening, and all were largely attended. In the morning, the routine business was attended to, reports were received, and the delegates were reassured regarding the financial and numerical vigor of their union. At the close of an earnest devotional half-hour, led by President Webb, of Toronto, they were ready to enter with zest into the helpful proceedings of the afternoon and evening.

After the delegates were welcomed, by Rev. Dr. Sowerby, and a reply to his welcome made by Mr. J. E. Houson, of Toronto, the following report of the nomination committee was received and adopted:

President—W. E. Robertson, B.A., Toronto.

Vice-Presidents—Rev. L. Brown, Petrolia; Rev. C. H. Emerson, Meaford; A. J. Raddon, Peterboro.

Recording Secretary—A. S. Woodburne, London.

Corresponding Secretary—H. Ballantyne, Toronto.

Treasurer—Rev. Geo. T. Webb, Toronto.

Rev. Dr. Bovington, of Windsor; Rev. S. J. Farmer, of Brantford, and Rev. Dr. Harris, president of the Toronto Bible Training School, addressed the delegates in the afternoon, and in the discussion that followed Dr. Bovington's address, interesting speeches were made by Rev. J. J. Baker, of this city; Mr. Wm. Pratt, of Petrolia; Rev. H. C. Speller, of Sarnia; Rev. D. Dack, of Stratford, and Mr. Wm. Gurney, of London.

Mr. E. A. Brynmor, B. A., of Hespeler, opened the evening session with song, and Miss Brown sang "The Ninety and Nine." Rev. Mr. Parker, M. A. of the First Avenue Church, Toronto; Prof. A. L. McCrimmon, M. A., of Woodstock College, and Rev. Dr. Harris spoke in the evening.

The union meeting, which brought the speaker asked that they bring their concentrated intelligence to Christ. He emphasized the thought of concentration of their consecrated efforts. They should aim to bring one man to Christ, and never give up till they had attained their wish. If they could get but a consciousness of God's love personally, they must be of more power. They should realize in this work that they had the Master's presence. The young man or woman who was conscious not only of his love, but of his divine presence, must be a power for good. They should also cultivate a passion for souls if they would be successful in this work of evangelization.

The theme chosen by Dr. Harris, who led the consecration service, was "The Spirit of God." He told his hearers of the desire for exaltation was right, but they must not get it from wine, but on the contrary, from the Holy Spirit as the Word says: "Be not drunk with wine wherein is excess, but be ye filled with the Spirit." The fullness of the Spirit meant that the taints of the being had been given unto to quit, and very soon was surrendered to the Spirit, who filled and flowed through the being. What they needed was not more of the Spirit, but that the Spirit have more of us. The Spirit was power that worked through the surrendered being. The first essential was approval of motion. It must be for the glory of God. Pride must be banished from their hearts. There must be ardent desire. If they realized in their ministry that they cannot live without the Spirit, then they would receive the filling. There must be absolute surrender of self, he said.

What hindered their usefulness in service was the obstruction of self. As we went down Christ increased in might and power. He said that there must be appropriate faith. They could not all be great preachers, great believers. They might not have much power, but their disposal was all the power of God. His concluding word was that they must have abiding fellowship. They should let nothing break their fellowship with Christ.
