Big Battleship for Britain.

New York, Feb. 10.-A special cable to ed. the Herald from London says: That the British Admiralty is not blind to the rapid increase in the number of ships of greater displacement and improved armament which characterizes the building programmes of other maritime powers is shown by its own programe, the property feature of which is a new type warship surpassing all the existing bat-tleships in size and power, designed by Mr. Watts. There will be three of these big fighting machines built. Their dis-placement will reach 18,000 tons, which is early 2,000 tons more than the King Ed nearly 2,000 tons more than the King Burder ward class, the largest type of battle-ship built by any power. They will carry four 12-inch guns, placed in pairs in two barbettes, fore and aft; also eight new pattern 9,2-inch guns, mounted in pairs; four smaller turrets, ten or twelve 6-inch cutch fores. As a remarkable feature. quick firers. As a remarkable feature, they carry twelve heavy, armor-piercing guns, well protected by armor, gun, an extremely powerful piece, firing a 380-pound shell twice or three times a minute. The speed will be ninteen knots.
