Josephine.

We were a handful of English people who inhabited the old French Creole city of St. Pierre, writes Wiliam Trowbridge, in London Black and White. "Fou Anglais," the native people called us in their soft, rapid patois. Because we did mad things in the way of exploring their beautiful island—things very harm-less and natural to persons in strange countries, but utterly impossible to the well-regulated Creole. But Martinique, the Pearl of the Antilles, was too fascinating to leave without having seen it thoroughly. So on fere-days and Sundays we half-score mad English exiles slipped the chains of work that tied us to the busy old-world town and scoured Martinique like the common or garden tourists. EMPRESS JOSEPHINE'S BIRTH-

PLACE. At the end of three months I had seen the blackened ruin, in a tangle of aloes and wild-banana trees, that the birthplace of press Josephine; I had seen H. M. S. Diamond, as a rock in the sea near Forte de France is called, where in the grand old wars a handful of Rodney's bluejackets for several months laughed o scorn all efforts of the redoubtable De Grasse to dislodge them; I had seen Behanzin, king of Dahomey, exile and prisoner of state in Martinique, and photographed him in the midst of his wives and children; I had seen the Fontaine Chaude, when high above the sea in the balmy air of a bamboo forest the fever-stricken French soldiers bathe away the malaria in a hot sulphur spring that gushes out of the rocks; I had seen the wonderful Grande Anse, where the Atlantic breaks on the shore in billows half a mile long; I had made myself hail- (Con.), 419. fellow-well-met at all the Usines, where the French Royalist planters, as in the good old times. In a word I

Two miles out of the town we passed the Usine Guerin, one of the largest sugar factories in Martinique, which in these very days has been obliterated by the lava river as it rushed with incredible velocity down the slope of Mont Pelee. In the great yard strewed with newly-reaped sugar-cane young Guerin was standing in the midst of his laborers, who were singing a patois song as they worked to a weird African air. Five miles further on at the fishing village of Precheur we found the parish priest pruning his rose trees in a quaint Creole garden.
