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TRIAL FOR IONS

Charged With Brutal Assault on Kalls, the Lacrosse Player.

Toronto, Aug. 11.—Mickey Ions was today committed for trial on a charge of assaulting George Kalls, at the lacrosse match on Aug. 2. McIntyre, of Ottawa, judge of the game, described the assault as he saw it. His evidence was corroborated by Mr. R. Harris, the property commissioner of the city, and two others. Their story was to the effect that during the game, when Kalls was tying his shoe, Ions came up behind him and kicked him in the face. McIntyre declared that all through this present season there had been a great deal of brutality. In committing Ions, and all going to jail, Col. Denison, the magistrate instructed the city police to bring all persons, guilty of rough play, or of violating the rules of ordinary decency at such games, before him. Bail was fixed at \$200.

A LACROSSE GAME PLAYED IN STRATHROY

Woodstock's Team Worsts the Locals, 5 to 0—Strathroy Wins Ball Game.

NEWFOUNDLAND CABLE

Contract Made by the Bond Government Repudiated.

New York, Aug. 11.—In 1904, as soon as the Newfoundland Government was free from the fifty-year monopoly granted to original cable enterprises, it took steps to provide its land-line system of telegraphs with its own cable connection. It first laid a cable from Port au Basque, Nfld., to Canso, N. S., and made a contract with the Commercial Cable Company to operate the Canso end. The breaking of this cable soon after it was laid made the Government anxious to secure its foreign communications

by other cables. The Commercial Cable Company has several cables running to the south of Newfoundland, and the Government invited the company to run one or more of them into Newfoundland. A contract was made which required the company to establish an office in St. Johns, in communication with the cables, and to pay the established tax for the cable-landing privilege, and the Government to pay the company \$4,000 a year for the facilities provided for the Government's cable business, the company being debarred from doing any cable business with the public for its own account in Newfoundland.

This contract was made by the Bond Government, which was defeated at the polls at the recent election, and the new Government has notified the company that it will not recognize the contract as binding. The company has replied at considerable length, stating that on the faith of the contract it has expended over a million dollars in extending its cable to Newfoundland, which it would not otherwise have done. The Newfoundland Government, it says, would lose nothing in revenue by adhering to the terms of the contract, while it would gain largely in facilities by having direct cable connection with New York. The company ends its protest by stating that this, it believes, is the first time in the history of Great Britain or its dependencies that a contract made with a responsible Government has been repudiated by a succeeding Administration.

SEEKING A SETTLEMENT

Differences Between Chicago Street Car Companies and Men Discussed.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—Efforts to bring about a peaceful settlement of the dispute between the street car companies of this city and their employees was resumed today with great vigor, and while no definite action was expected to result from the two conferences scheduled to be held in the afternoon, yet it was hoped by both sides that the negotiations would clear many obstacles which thus far have blocked the way to a solution of the problem. Union officials still were firm in their demand for modification of the wage schedule proposed by the traction companies, while the companies were willing to concede to the men, the street car officials apparently were willing to concede to these demands if it could be done without paying the way for additional concessions.

NOT ENOUGH RAIN.

Grimsby, Aug. 11.—Tomato men are becoming alarmed over the continued dry spell that is resulting in the vegetable being touched with the rot that is ever prevalent under such weather conditions as the past few weeks. There has been no rain of any account in the Central Niagara district for over three weeks, and all varieties of vegetable is suffering. On the sandy lands along the lake this is not quite so noticeable.

INSANE WOMAN BARRED

Refused Admission to Canada by Immigration Authorities.

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Aug. 11.—Driven insane by the complexities of immigration requirements, Mrs. Ann Kulaj left here tonight in charge of a Government Inspector for New York, whence she will be deported to her home in Austria.

Two months ago the woman and her 15-year-old daughter were passed at New York and permitted to buy tickets for Ladysmith, B. C., where they were to join the husband and father; but at Prescott, Ont., they were turned back by Canadian officers on the ground that they had not sufficient funds. Unable to make her self understood, the mother lost her reason and has since been confined in the State Hospital here. The Canadian authorities now agree to admit the daughter, and she will be sent to join her father.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—The Immigration authorities state that two months ago admission to Canada was refused to a Polish woman at Prescott because she was insane. The report that she went insane after being denied admission is incorrect. Her husband had settled in Canada and sought to bring in his wife and daughter. The daughter was admitted, but the doctors having declared the woman insane her admission was refused, as the immigration law declares specifically that no insane person can be admitted to Canada under any circumstances.

BLUE RIBBON OF THE AIR

Forty-two Aeroplanes Gathered For Contest at Rheims, France.

New York, Aug. 11.—Forty-two aeroplanes, the largest number ever brought together for a series of contests, have been entered in the events at Rheims, France, during the week of Aug. 20, according to special cable dispatches to the Herald.

The pilots entered for the races include every prominent aviator in France, together with a few newcomers and a small number of foreign representatives. Among the different types of machines represented are the Wright, Voisin, Bleriot, Antonette, the Herring-Curtis and the R. E. P., all of which already have given ample proof of their ability to fly.

France, America, England, Austria and Italy are entered in the race for the Coupe Internationale d'Aviation, which has been incorporated in the Rheims programme, and will be competed for on Aug. 28. As the rules governing the contest for a Coupe Internationale limit the number of pilots to three to a nation—and France has thirteen aspirants, an elimination race will be held Aug. 22. The other four nations entered but one machine each, America being represented by Mr. Glenn H. Curtis and Italy by Lieut. Calderara. Austria and England have taken advantage of the clause by which the name of the pilot need not be announced until 24 hours before the race.

There being no limit to the number of aeroplanes which may be entered for the races organized by the Rheims committee, several makers have put in more than one machine. The Wright international interests are represented by several aeroplanes, the Bleriot by five, the Voisin by seven and the Antonette by three.

NO POLLUTION.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 11.—In view of the scare caused by the fact that Aylmer is pouring its untreated sewage into the Ottawa River, extensive analysis of Ottawa's water supply has been made at the city hall, it being announced today that there is no trace of any pollution. The result will be to allay the fears of a large section of citizens. Samples have also been sent to Toronto for provincial analysis.

FIGHT FATAL DUEL IN PARLOR OF HOME

Wife Dead and Her Husband Probably Mortally Wounded.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—Jealousy led to a revolver duel between husband and wife yesterday, fought before their two baby daughters. The woman is dead, and the husband lies in the Peoples' Hospital, suffering from probably mortal wounds. The principals in the domestic tragedy, which occurred in their home at 2318 Lowe avenue, were Philip Spizziri and his wife.

Before the pair engaged in their last quarrel both back and front doors of the house were locked and barred. No sounds were heard by the neighbors, until a revolver shot startled them, followed by a second shot, and after a short interval, two more shots.

When Policeman John S. Loop, hurriedly summoned by persons in the neighborhood, rushed down the rear door of the flat, he found Spizziri lying face downward on the parlor floor. The woman's body was lying full length on a couch in the same room. One revolver lay several feet in front of the man's head, as if he had flung the man forward when he fell. Another revolver lay alongside his body, and a stiletto was on the head of the couch near the woman's face.

A single sob from a back bedroom attracted the policeman's attention, and he ran in to find two babies, wide-eyed and weeping. Emma, 2 years old, was sitting on a little crib, and Mary, 3 years old, was standing crouched against her small sister. They were too terror-stricken to talk and too frightened to cry out.

A movement of the man drew the policeman to the parlor again, and he said:

"What has happened here?"
"I don't know," came the muffled answer.

"Did you shoot her?"
"She shot first and then you fired?" the officer interrogated.

"Yes, that's it."

The man moved his hands to his throat and the policeman and neighbors grasped them away. A letter in Italian, written with lead pencil, he had torn to small bits. He refused to tell the police the contents of the letter, but upon further questioning said his wife had been receiving the attentions of other men, naming Louis Puzzo, a barber who lives at Nineteenth street and Archer avenue.

"We quarrelled about it," the man muttered, "and she shot at me."

The police found that the woman had been shot twice, in the middle of the chest and above the heart. Two stiletto wounds were found over the heart. The man received two bullet wounds, one in the chest and the other in the right ear, the bullet having come through the back of the neck. All of the cartridges in the revolver lying in front of the man had been snapped, but three had failed to explode.

One theory of the police is that the man shot his wife twice, and the other cartridges missing fire he seized the stiletto and plunged it into her heart. At what stage of the duel the woman shot him is problematical. The woman shot him or perhaps indicates that she shot her husband as he turned from the couch on which she had been lying or had fallen.

SHIP CAPTAIN GOES MAD

Members of Crew Lock Him in Held and Sail to Port.

Portland, Me., Aug. 11.—The two-masted coasting schooner Nettie B. Dobbin, from Boston, bound to Millbridge, Me., arrived in port this morning to land the master and owner, Capt. Walter Small, who became violently insane Sunday.

The Dobbin left Boston early Sunday morning and was proceeding on her trip with a full cargo, when suddenly Capt. Small began chasing the mate and one sailor about the deck, flourishing an axe and shouting, "They are stealing my vessel from me on the high seas!" The men became terror-stricken, and one of them jumped into the hold to get away from him, while the enraged man continued to chase the other about the deck, still holding the axe.

In the meantime a man in the hold came up, and with the assistance of the crew the three finally overpowered the captain after a hard struggle. He was put in the hold, the hatch covers put on, and then battened down with ropes run through the ring bolts. For the remainder of Sunday and all last night the crew heard the captain moving about in the hold and shouting at the top of his voice. On arriving in Portland the mate went ashore and notified the police.

MAN LIVED 10 YEARS IN GARB OF WOMAN

Shooting Affair Reveals Disguise of Storekeeper at High Falls.

Newburgh, Aug. 12.—A shooting affair at High Falls, Ulster County, late last night resulted in the discovery of a supposed woman being in reality a man. For the last ten years residents of that section have been buying notions of "Sarah Long," who kept a store at High Falls. The storekeeper disposed of much merchandise, and the people of the vicinity showed her due respect and friendship.

"Sarah" lived alone in an apartment near the store. Joe Lewis, a colored man, was one of the several hundred laborers brought to High Falls by contractors on the aqueduct for the New York water supply system there, and Joe immediately became a customer. Sunday evening he went into the store after drinking heavily, and an altercation followed. "Sarah" attempted to strike him with an iron bar, when the customer pulled a revolver and fired the bullet striking the supposed woman in the head. The patient was hurried to a hospital. Though suffering intensely, an attempt by the nurses to take off the garments was opposed, but the patient was overpowered, and then it was discovered that "Sarah Long" was a man.

LAMB'S BONE IN MAN

Grafting of Animal's Bone Proves Surgical Success.

Chicago, Aug. 12.—Chicago will furnish one of the surgical sensations at the world's medical congress in Budapest in August. Dr. Cassius C. Rogers, of this city, has left for Europe to attend the great convention, and he carries with him the tidings of one of the strangest operations ever conducted successfully in the United States.

On June 17 Dr. Rogers and Dr. W. Hubert Miller grafted a piece of lamb's bone into the leg of D. C. Townsend, 7233 Vincennes road, at the Frances Willard Hospital. It was the first successful operation of the kind in this country.

Four years ago Townsend fell into an elevator shaft and broke his right tibia bone. Repeated attempts to reunite the parts were unsuccessful. Finally Dr. Rogers and Dr. Miller decided to make the unique experiment of grafting a lamb's bone into Townsend's leg. The man was admitted to the Frances Willard Hospital June 14. The operation took place on June 17, and July 19 the patient was discharged as cured.

The tibia of a living lamb 3½ inches long was used. The animal was killed after giving up its bone. The bone was put into Townsend's leg and covered with fresh stripped periosteum of the lamb in order to get blood supply and bone-forming layer.

Just before leaving for Europe, Dr. Rogers examined Townsend again, and had an X-ray picture taken. He found a perfect union. He told the patient that all was well and that the plaster cast could be removed in three weeks.

SKELTONS OF TWO MEN

Supposed To Be Those of the Indian Chief Pontiac and His Son.

Detroit, Aug. 12.—In doing some plying on Apple Island in Orchard Lake, Michigan, a spot with which many legendary tales are connected, the skeletons of two men, supposedly Indians, were turned up by Wesley Smith.

The bones were covered with a sort of skin or cloth in which the bodies had been buried, and which were much decayed from their long interment in the soil. In the grave was found many old Indian and ancient relics.

The exact burial place of Chief Pontiac has never been known. But legends have long connected this island with the mystery, and for years it has been supposed that the venerable old chief lay buried somewhere within its borders.

Also, the legend relates that a favorite son of the chief was buried with him, and some day their last resting place would be discovered.

While it cannot be definitely stated that the skeletons found are those of Chief Pontiac and his son, the measurements taken, and the relics found, seem to bear out the fact that there is a good possibility that such might be the case.

A PECULIAR DECISION.

Montreal, Aug. 12.—A remarkable decision was rendered by Judge Choquet in the court of sessions when he allowed an accused man his freedom

because of an irregularity, committed by Justice of the Peace Brouillett, of L'Epiphanie, who committed the man to the court of King's bench without first reading over the stenographic notes of the case as is the regular proceeding. The accused was kept in jail until July, the Judge of Joliette County being unable to do anything towards giving him a speedy trial.

Judge Choquet, in reviewing the case, said the proceeding was irregular, and, having the authority to dismiss the case, he did so. Landry, although not proven guilty, had spent seven months in jail.

FOUND IN WELL.

McComb, Ohio, Aug. 11.—The bodies of Mrs. James H. Ritter and her daughter were found in an abandoned well by the woman's husband, who noted their absence at an early hour this morning. The coroner pronounced the case suicide. Mrs. Ritter had been in ill-health. The body of the child was clasped tightly in the woman's arms.
