The Labor Minister Saw Strike Leader, But Nothing Was Given Out.

Montreal, July 29.—It is thought that the prospects for a speedy settle-ment of the dispute between the Grand Trunk Railway and their conductors trainmen were increased this morning by a conference between Vice-President Murdock, of the union, and Mr. Mackenzie King, minister of labor. Mr. King refused to make any statement after the meeting, and Mr. Murdock said that no peace proposition was discussed.

"We merely talked over the situaion." Mr. Murdock said afterwards, "and no proposals were made by the minister, nor did I suggest any terms for a settlement." It is understood, however, that this

morning's conference was the first step in a plan which the Minister of Labor has formed to bring the opposing fac-tions in the big labor war together and ultimately effect a settlement.


