EXPENDITURE TO DATE ON HORTON ST. WELLS

City Has Paid Out \$51,443.39

—The List of Payments Made.

At the meeting of the water commissioners last night a statement of the expenditure in connection with the Horton street pumping plant, was presented by Auditor Jewell.

Up to date, the city has paid out \$51,443.39, and has retained \$18,901.48. Certificates of work have been paid to the extent of \$70,344.87, leaving a balance of \$2,555.12 to take care of future expenditures.

The individual payments were as follows: Hon. Adam Beck, \$22,005.07; Forest City Paving Company, \$15,625.08; retained, \$11,083.39. Total certificates, \$27,708.47. H. J. Gault, \$6,000, full of claim; Galtshore & Thompson, paid \$2,897.45, retained \$1,657.56, amount of certificates \$3,955.01; H. & J. Daniels, \$2,490, retained \$5,810, certificates, \$8,300.

The total contract given to Mr. Beck was \$98,700. The total amount of certificates for work amounts to \$70,344.87, leaving \$28,355.13 to be expended for further pumps and machinery. This table does not include the two electric turbines and motors that have not yet been delivered. These will be paid for out of the \$28,000 still remaining.

It is thought the contract can be carried out for less than the original estimate.

JULY WAS VERY WET

2.76 INCHES OF RAIN

More Rain Than Last Year But Much Less Than in July of 1908.

The weather report for July shows that during the month 2.76 inches of rain fell. Of this amount 1 inch fell in the storm of last Sunday, and half an inch in yesterday's storm. The total rainfall for July, 1909, was 1.11, while in July of 1908 there was 2.35 inches. The hottest day of the month was on July 9, when the mercury climbed to 96.5, and the coolest was on July 5, when the temperature was 47. The hottest day of July, 1909, was 90.5, and the coldest 42.5.

WILL SELL OLD BRIDGE NEW ONE ON DUNDAS ST.

Special Committee of London Township Council Met Yesterday to Deal With Matter.

At a meeting of a special committee of the London Township council, held yesterday afternoon, it was decided to sell the old bridge over the Governor's road to the county council, who will use it to replace the bridge on the sidewalk near the old Packing Company's plant, which was badly damaged when a traction engine went through it on Tuesday last, and erect a new reinforced bridge on the Governor's road.

Engineer Talbot was instructed to go ahead and prepare the necessary plans and specifications. The new bridge will be a very handsome substantial affair with a span of 32 feet, a 16-foot driveway and a four-foot walk.

LIGHTNING BOLT STRUCK HAMILTON ROAD HOUSE

\$600 Damage Caused to the Residence of Mr. George Spearin.

Fire, caused by lightning, did \$600 damage to the store of Geo. Spearin, 188 Hamilton road, yesterday afternoon during the storm.

A bolt struck the chimney and went through to the ground. The bricks were scattered in all directions. In a moment or two flames burst out, and an alarm was sent in. After a stubborn fight the fire was extinguished. There was no person in the kitchen at the time.

The department had some difficulty in reaching the fire owing to the heavy roads. The Hamilton road is being repaired, and the heavy rig sank in the mud. The truck could not reach the fire.

LAMBTON HIT BY A CYCLONE

Cuts Swath Two Miles Long in Bosanquet Township.

FALLING BARN CRUSHED TWO

Crops Levelled, Trees Down and Part of Forest Cemetery Wrecked—A Destructive Bolt Near Chatham.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Forest, Ont., July 30.—Cutting a swath two miles long and 600 yards wide, a cyclone swept through Bosanquet Township early yesterday afternoon, doing immense damage to crops and property generally. It was accompanied by a terrific downpour of hail and rain, and was the worst storm of this type that has ever visited Lambton County. No lives were lost, but George Codling, a farmer on the 16th concession, and his mother were caught beneath a collapsing barn, and the former terribly injured. His jaw was broken and he is suffering from internal injuries, while his mother is also badly bruised and shaken up. The barn, which contained the season's crops, was a total wreck.

Everything went down that was in the path of the storm, corn, sugar beets, wheat and other crops being levelled, and hopelessly ruined. Orchard trees also suffered in large numbers.

The cyclone cut across a corner of the cemetery about half a mile north of this place, badly wrecking everything in the way of fences, bushes and trees and upsetting a half dozen monuments.

Chatham, July 29.—Fire started this afternoon in Wood Smith's barns, near Kent Bridge, and destroyed one end of the main building. The total loss will be over \$2,000. Lightning struck the building while Mr. Smith was threshing, and the fire reaching the grain and hay spread rapidly, and one end of the barn was soon in flames. The men succeeded in getting out the stock, and the threshing outfit, and the house and other buildings were saved. The barns were insured.

ATTEMPT AT ROBBERY

Store on Richmond Street Was Entered by a Thief.

A daring attempt was made about 3 o'clock on Wednesday morning to rob the store of Mrs. Julia Shelton, at 719 Richmond street. The thief, who was seen by the storekeeper, entered the store by the front door, which was left open and the thief, by using a gum slot as a step climbed up and swung himself through. The noise he made getting down on the inside awakened Mrs. Shelton and she at once got up. The man was then in a passageway, and when he saw her coming he said, "You stay where you are," and ran back, turned the key and opening the door ran down the street. The affair was reported to the policeman on the beat, but no trace could be found of the burglar.

MURDOCK AND KING TALKED IT OVER

The Labor Minister Saw Strike Leader, But Nothing Was Given Out.

Montreal, July 29.—It is thought that the prospects for a speedy settlement of the dispute between the Grand Trunk Railway and their conductors and trainmen were increased this morning by a conference between Vice-President Murdock, of the union, and Mr. Mackenzie King, minister of labor. Mr. King refused to make any statement after the meeting, and Mr. Murdock said that no peace proposition was discussed.

"We merely talked over the situation," Mr. Murdock said afterwards, "and no proposals were made by the minister, nor did I suggest any terms for a settlement."

It is understood, however, that this morning's conference was the first step in a plan which the Minister of Labor has formed to bring the opposing factions in the big labor war together and ultimately effect a settlement.

At the Grand Trunk offices it was stated that nothing was known of any further negotiations towards the settlement of the dispute by arbitration. President Hays and Vice-president Fitzhugh both spent the morning in their offices attending to routine work.

Mr. Hays said he had not been officially notified of Mr. Mackenzie King's visit to the city, and that the minister of labor had not asked for a further conference with him. It is understood that a meeting between the Grand Trunk president and the minister will take place this evening, with a view to arranging for another conference with the representatives of the men.

To His Honor.

Ben. J. Wilson, a noted labor speaker, who has been engaged in an eighteen months' tour of England, arrived in the city this morning. He had an interview with Mr. Murdock, and it was announced afterwards that he will address his mass meetings of the strikers and their sympathizers on the Champ de Mars tomorrow afternoon and on Sunday.

This is believed to be in line with Mr. Murdock's statement, yesterday that if the company would not agree to arbitration, the unions would begin to push the fight. The local police will make special arrangements for a large guard of men to keep order when the mass meetings are being held, fearing

It was on this point that the union leaders and the officials of the company split up in the first approaches towards arbitration. President Hays repeated this morning that he would on no account displace the men taken on since the strike, and Vice-President Murdock again said the union would consider no proposition which did not include the taking on of all the strikers.

Comber, July 28. — E. O. Smith, a farmer living about four miles from Comber, in the township of Rochester, dropped dead yesterday while entering his home for dinner. Deceased was 44 years of age and leaves a widow, but no children.
