OCCIDENT CHAPTER FROM TORONTO HERE VISITING ST. GEORGE'S

Occident Royal Arch Chapter of Toronto Here Sixty Strong.

St. George's Chapter Were the Hosts at New Masonic Temple.

"The most successful affair we ever held" was the verdict passed by members of St. George's Royal Arch Chapter at the conclusion of a banquet Tuesday evening given in honor of Occident Royal Arch Chapter of Toronto. Such a verdict implies a good deal, for St. George's Chapter has distinguished itself as host on numerous occasions. When the guests fled out of the new Masonic Temple on Queen's avenue at an early hour in the morning, all said it had been the "best ever."

Came Sixty Strong.
About sixty members of Occident Chapter accepted the invitation to visit the Forest City. They met with several vexatious delays during the journey from Toronto, but petty annoyances were soon forgotten in the hearty welcome extended them by their brother Masons of this city, who turned out to the number of one hundred to greet them.

The officers of the Toronto Chapter exemplified the Royal Arch degree in a very capable manner, which called forth many flattering remarks later in the evening.

Adjourned to Feast.
At the conclusion of the conferring of the degree an adjournment was made to the spacious banquet hall in the basement of the new temple. Here ample preparations had been made for their coming, and no detail which would help to satisfy the demands of the inner man had been overlooked.

A pleasing feature in the arrangements was the way in which the tables were placed. They stretched in unbroken succession around three sides of the room, and were so placed that they formed the outlines of the key-stone of an arch, which is the symbol of Royal Arch Masonry. The menu cards were also attractively gotten up in a similar shape.

Presided as Toastmaster.
Ex. Comp. Frank Millar, first principal of St. George's Chapter, presided as toastmaster. After a toast to "The King and the Craft," Excellent Companion E. Goethe Quantz proposed a toast to "The Grand Z and the Chapter of Canada." It was responded to by Excellent Companion Harry T. Smith, of Toronto; Right Excellent Companion Millen, of Toronto; Right Excellent Companion E. Goethe Quantz, of Toronto; and Right Excellent Companion Fred Palmer, of London.

R. E. Comp. Smith drew attention to the large and increasing membership of the Masonic order. "The capitol of order is progressive," he said. "It is bound to do good work and such fraternizing as we are enjoying to-night will help to strengthen the royal craft."

Proud of Toronto.
Mr. Millar expounded in the Toronto chapters. "They are all doing good work," he remarked, "but we must not overlook the fact that we have an important commission. That commission is to educate the common people, and to bring them into the Royal Arch Chapter. We must see that we are teaching them to lead better lives, to become better citizens."

In response to a toast to the Dominion of Canada, Comp. E. T. Essery delivered a stirring patriotic address. "Canada is the best part of the British Empire," said he, "always was and always will be; and the British Empire is the best the world ever saw. All the world has to admire a nation which flies such a flag as Canada. We have wheat fields a million miles long and 300 miles wide, and mountains which, if the Alps could see, they would hide their heads in shame."

He paid a warm tribute to the colors of our flag, the battles of Canada in the early days, and also to the Canadian soldiers who went to South Africa to fight against the Boers.

Were Well Received.
His words found an echo in every heart, judging by the applause which greeted his remarks. His address was preceded by the rendition of "O Canada" by the Masonic Male Quartette.

Visiting companions were enthusiastically received and responded to by Ex. Comps. Newdick, Hickson, Montgomery, Larter and Proctor, for Occident Chapter Ex. Comp. J. T. Lester for St. Andrew and St. John's Chapter, Toronto, and Ex. Comp. Roberts for King Solomon Chapter, Toronto, and the members of the local chapter received many flattering comments on their abilities as hosts.

The new temple also came in for very favorable comment. One speaker expressing the belief that it was the best-appointed on the North American continent.

Invited to Toronto.
A hearty invitation to visit Toronto in the near future was extended by the visitors, which the officers of St. George Chapter promised to accept in the near future.

SLAMS ASSESSMENT AND GIVES FIGURES TO PROVE ASSERTION

Joseph Lawrence, of South London Progressives, Speaks of Wyatt Property.

Says That He Will Continue to Investigate Civic Departments.

Vice-President Joseph Lawrence of the South London Progressive Association presented further facts at the meeting of that organization Tuesday evening in regard to the laxity in the various departments of the city hall administration.

Mr. Lawrence stated that although the present council was elected only two months ago, several of the aldermen had already succeeded in getting relatives appointed to positions in the city hall offices.

Wages Doubled.
"The total amount of wages in the city hall has been doubled during the last two years. I wish to correct an impression that was created by my remarks last week. I did not say that all the old men in the employ of the city should be discharged, but I did say that they should be contented with the salaries that they were getting better for they were given an assistant. At each meeting I intend to show up the muddle and mismanagement in one of the departments."

"If you want municipal affairs conducted in an economic manner, never vote for a candidate who has a son or a daughter."

Inequality of Assessments.
Mr. Lawrence also referred to the inequality of the assessments in various parts of the city.

"I spoke last meeting about Mr. William Wyatt defending the assessment commissioner, and the following will show that he had good cause to do so. Mr. Wyatt is the owner of the Holston Block on Dundas street, opposite the site of the Federal Square, and his property consists of three stores and a stable. A low valuation of the land would be \$20,000, as the city paid \$600 a foot for the McCormick property across the street, and the buildings are worth \$20,000, making a low estimate of the whole property at \$40,000."

"The monthly rental is \$210, which is \$2,520 per year. This property, gentlemen, is assessed for \$9,500, which is only 23 per cent of the value."

Want Him to Continue.
The members of the association advised Mr. Lawrence to continue his investigations, and will take the matter up at a future meeting.

Mr. W. West suggested that the association place on record its disapproval of the establishment of a licensed liquor store in the East End.

"We call ourselves progressives, and we should do everything possible to stamp out this evil, which is the greatest enemy of progress in the world."

President Gerry stated that the temperance people had taken the matter up, and that while he was against the issuing of a license, he thought that the best thing to do would be to leave it in the hands of the temperance workers. We certainly would not stand for the shop of that nature in South London."

The park committee of the association reported that it was to meet the park commissioners on Thursday afternoon, and was requested to ask that a better fence and entrance be erected on Ridout street at the Parke Flats playground. This committee was empowered to ask that the railing on Ridout street south of Victoria bridge be extended 60 or 100 feet further, as the present railing did not offer sufficient protection.

Nineteen Confirmed at St. George's by Bishop Williams

Nineteen candidates for confirmation were presented to His Lordship Bishop Williams by Rev. Canon Sarg, rector of St. George's Church, West London, at a confirmation service held last night.

His lordship preached a sermon from the text, "He that overcometh shall inherit all things." The evangelist, St. John, placed great emphasis upon the need of being conquerors, and not slaves in our life.

"Our position in this world is, as it were, between heaven and earth, and it is our destiny to endeavor to grasp the things of heaven. If we cling to the things of earth we become degraded. We sink instead of rise," said his lordship.

"In our own inner lives we need to become masters of ourselves, of our appetites and passions, or they will master us. The same battle must be fought out in our organized work. If rightly pursued it may be a worship of God, but if we become the slave of our work, following it solely to acquire fame, or to heap up wealth, we forget God."

This danger was present in joy and sorrow, and in every experience of life. "The danger of the world is to be said his lordship, and if man is to be victorious in the battle he must rely upon the spirit of God to help him. The bishop likened the human soul to an electric wire that is weak and useless unless through it. In the warfare against the world, the flesh and the devil, it was necessary, he said, to have the current of God's holy spirit moving and directing our lives.
