Enemy Deceiving Wecker In Assaults On Allies

Have No Word of Any British Warships In Chilean Ports

HUNDREDS COMMEND STAND TAKEN BY ALD. MITCHELL

Father of Motion Says He Has No Doubt as to Public Sentiment.

MAYOR WANTS MEETING

Says He Is Ready To Defend Manager at Public Gathering.

LET COUNCIL ACT FIRST

This Is View of Mr. Mitchell as to Settlement of the Matter.

Mayor Graham stated this morning that he was willing to have the question of the right of H. J. Glauzitz to retain office as manager of the hydro and water departments of this city taken before a mass-meeting of citizens. He said that at a city meeting he would be prepared to defend Mr. Glauzitz, and stand for retaining him in office. He thought the people at the meeting should decide the matter.

"We should not become fevered over this matter," said the mayor. "We should discuss it as citizens and find out what public sentiment is. I will take the platform against the dismissal of Mr. Glauzitz, and let the audience decide what should be done."

When called by The Advertiser as to the mayor's suggestion, Ald. F. G. Mitchell stated that it would be time to take up the matter of a mass-meeting when the city council has acted in the matter.

Up to the Council. "I have done what I believed to be my duty," he said. "I have brought this matter to the attention of the city council. It is up to the council to decide what is to be done. In my mind there is no doubt as to public sentiment, and I think you will see the afternoon reflect that sentiment in a striking manner. Let the mayor face the issue in the council, where it has been brought forward. When we have disposed of it there, it will be time enough to bring it up in mass-meeting. Anyone who wants to dodge the issue or equivocate can do so when the council meets in two weeks."

"It may be interesting to know that before I brought this matter up I had hundreds of people—that is no exaggeration—stop me on the street and discuss the matter. Since I made my motion I have had at least 100 telephone calls commending me for my stand, and I have had almost everyone I met on the street stop me, and tell me that I had done the right thing, and the only thing so that you see I have a pretty good line on public opinion—enough to give me courage, if I needed it, to carry out a motion to dismiss Mr. Glauzitz. One large association of Britishers has expressed itself unanimously, and I believe that other meetings are to be held. I think his worship should have stated enough 'public sentiment' on which to form an opinion before the next council meeting is held. Yet, remember, that I do not say that I am not acting courageously. I have nothing against either Mr. or Mrs. Cook for the strong stand in favor of Mr. Glauzitz. We are all doing what we believe to be right, and I do not see the foolish talk of opposing Glauzitz because of hydro-electric. That is merely trying to drag a Bismarck across the water."

People are not thinking of hydro-electric in this matter. They are thinking of Glauzitz in his relation to the country. Whether I am supported by one man or a dozen, I mean to carry this thing through."

British Society Takes Action. At a meeting of the British Social Union held last night, the executive committee passed a resolution (unanimously) requesting themselves to support Ald. Mitchell and Tancock in their action taken in respect to the position of Mr. Glauzitz under the utilities commission.

The above communication signed by W. Garratt, honorary general secretary of the B. S. U., has been handed in to The Advertiser for publication.

It is the first definite action taken by a local association in reference to the agitation for the resignation of the German-born manager of the London water and hydro-electric departments. Mr. Glauzitz has said that he will not resign, and Chairman Pocock has stated that he does not believe that Mr. Glauzitz's resignation should be asked for, in which contention he is supported by Commissioner Stevenson who has said that if the people wish Mr. Glauzitz to resign that he should do so.

Mr. Glauzitz has definitely denied rumors that have been in circulation concerning his movements. He has stated that he is on the side of Great Britain in the present war.

Despite these assertions, the British Social Union, an "all-British" fraternal organization, has taken the stand that the city council should ask the commissioners to secure the manager's resignation.

The attitude of Toronto. The Toronto Mail and Empire of yesterday contains an article which has a bearing on the local case, in which it calls of the disarming by the authorities in that city, whether residents or naturalized citizens of Canada. A large number of residents, guns and knives are being secured.

In one portion of its article the Mail and Empire says:
