200 TRAINED OFFICERS

Western University Training Corps Makes Amazing Progress, Says Capt. Murphy.

By next spring, the Officers' Training Corps, which is being conducted at the Western University, if the hopes of Capt. T. J. Murphy, the instructor, are realized, will have developed more than realized, will have developed more than 200 fully-trained and qualified lieutenants and captains. ants'and captains.

The course is considerably longer than that given to the provisional officers attending the class at the armories, who are expected to qualify within six weeks, but obviously it would be impossible to give instruction to 'Varsity students every day and practically all day, as is done in the case of the class of instruction, and the period of training therefor is bound to be longer.

Parade Twice Weekly.

Regular parades are held twice a week from 5 to 6 o'clock each Wednesday and Friday evening and additional parades from 8 to 10 o'clock each Monday and Friday evening are attended only those who have come into the class since began, and who are behind with their

At present 200 young men are taking the course, and in a week or two Capt. Murphy expects that it will be up to full strength of 236. By the end of the month he hopes to have it fully organ-

The course is prescribed by the military authorities at Ottawa, and comrises a syllabus which must be completed by each member of the corps beore he can take his examination. Capt Murphy is empowered to issue two classes of certificates, the one denoting that the holder has qualified in "grade A" and the other that he has completed he course for "grade B." The grade A certificate entitles him to sit for examnation to qualify as a lieutenant, and that for grade B gives him the right to ask to be examined as to his qualin-
