#### CANADIAN LIQUOR SHIPPED 10 U.S. IN CHRISTMAS TREES

Newark, N. J., Jan. 5 .- Canadian liquor dealers utilized the Christmas spirit and more specifically the Christmas tree to smuggle vast quantities of whiskey over the border into the United States during the holiday season, according to internal revenue agents here. This, they said, today was the chief reason for the flooding of the tree market which resulted in many dealers giving their stock away. Federal agents asserted that in the firry branches had been concealed many a quart of "red liquor," and that after these "decorations" had been removed added supplies of trees had been offered dealers already overstocked in the hope of reaping again the rich revenue of 1918.
