Ottawa, April 26 .- Canadian Press. The bank statement for March shows but little change from the figures for the previous month, in so far as deposits are concerned. Savings banks deposits show a slight increase over the February figures, and demand deposits a small decrease, both of them less than a million dollars. Deposits outside Canada declined from \$305,778. Current loans in Canada increased from \$1,266,235,381 at the end of February Call loans in Canada show an increase of approximately a million dollars, and call loans outside dropped from \$190,-413,527 to \$168,598,046.
