## SAYS PRINTERS NOT CONSIDERED

Dr. Salem Bland Gives Heated Address At Methodist Conference.

#### Dr. Fallis, Bookroom Steward, Warmly Defends Position in Matter.

TORONTO, Oct. 11.-Delegates to the general Methodist conference listened to rather a warm resolution on the dispute between the Methodist book room and its printers today when the report of the book and publishing committee was presented.

Dr. Salem Bland, Toronto, in an address pregnant with much feeling took the attitude that the printers view of the dispute had not been given adequate consideration, and was rather inclined to agree with their claim that the Book Room in 1919 had given them the assurance that when the master printers of United States adopted the 44-hour week, the Toronto printers would fall in line.

The charge that the master printers had attempted to smash the men's union was absolutely false, he declared. Throughout the conflict he had taken the stand that the bookroom shop should not be closed against union labor, nor against nonunion labor. He did not want to fight the printers, he said, but "in the industrial world one can pay too much for peace."

Following the explanation of Dr. Fallis there was a move to have the matter closed by taking a vote on the report of the committee, approving the action taken by Dr. Fallis, but the delegates from the West and Maritime Provinces strongly objected against any attempt to restrict discussion, and very sharply made their position known to the conference. They had come thousands of miles. they said, to deal with questions affecting the Metfodist Church, and they demanded free and full discusn of the cause of the dispute. 
