Man Is Killed Walking Tracks

Narrowly Escaped Death in Same Place Short Time Ago.

Toronto, Aug. 27.—Despite the fact that he had had a narrow escape from being killed by a train a short time ago, Cornelius Cannon, aged 52, ventured out again on the tracks at the same spot tonight and was killed by a light engine. The body was badly mangled.
Cannon, who was employed by the Canadian Wire Box Company, had a habit of taking a short cut over the tracks at the point where he was killed.
He was a widower, and has a son in Montreal.

H. HARVEY IS APPOINTED ALBERTA CHIEF JUSTICE

Hon. W. C. Simmons Elevated To Chief Justiceship of Trial Division.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—Appointments to the supreme court of Alberta, consequent on the death of Chief Justice D. L. Scott, were announced here tonight. Hon. Horace Harvey chief justice of the trial division of the supreme court, becomes chief justice of Alberta and president of the appellate division of the supreme court.
Hon. Wm. Charles Simmons, judge of the trial division, is elevated to the chief justiceship of that division and becomes ex officio a judge of the appellate division of the supreme court.
The vacancy on the trial division is filled by the appointment of Hon. John R. Boyle, K.C., of Edmonton, who succeeded Hon. Charles Stewart, now minister of the interior in the federal government, as leader of the opposition in the Alberta legislature.
Mr. Boyle is appointed a judge of the trial division and ex officio a judge of the appellate division of the supreme court.

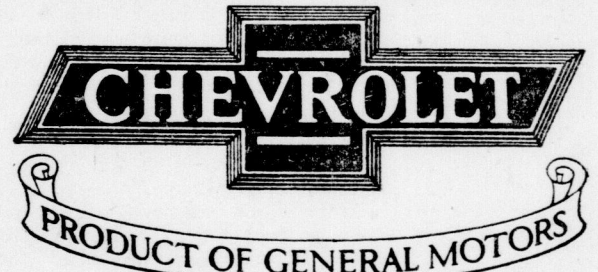
