But many signs indicate that the Ruhr stocks of fuel virtually are exhausted. Shipments the last ten days, according to

ments the last ten days, according to the French press, averaged 1,300 tons daily, compared with nearly 30,000 tons two months ago.

General Degoutte's recent order number 57 declares all mines confiscated in principle.

It places the inter-allied commission as the supreme administrative hody managing them and declares any available goods may be seized in payment of the coal tax which the Germans refuse. These orders are regarded here as a preliminary to a general attempt to exploit the mines and coke ovens.

Already the French have seized several, including the Harpener Works at Dorthfield and the Reckto operate coke ovens for the French, which they refused. The French fixed a list of punishments for those re-fusing to work and intimated that they might expel the miners with their wives and bables from their homes and also expel them from the occupied territory entirely.
