BELIEVE OLIVER WILL GET POST, RAILWAY BOARD

Premier Expected To Succeed the Late Dr. J. G. Rutherford.

Special to The Advertiser. Ottawa, Aug. 7.—It is practically certain that within the present week Hon. Frank Oliver, formerly minister of the interior in the Laurier government, will be appointed to the vacancy in the railway commission created by the death of the late Dr. J. G. Rutherford.

Strong representations (not confined to strictly party lines) have come from all parts of the west advocating the appointment, the feeling expressed appearing to be that Mr. Oliver will prove to be a staunch supporter of the people in railway matters. It is understood that there are several other aspirants for the position, but that Mr. Oliver's appointment is practically assured.

Succeeded Senator Forget. It is believed that Hon. J. L. Cole, formerly member of the late Stewart government, will succeed the late Senator Forget in the Upper House.

Premier Oliver arrived here this morning to take part in the hearing of the mountain scale rate case on Tuesday.

He had not much to say regarding the case except to reiterate his determination to stick to the case until the British Columbia receives the justice to which it is entitled, and to take nothing less. He called on Premier King and Hon. Jacques Bureau this morning with regard to the appointment of a Canadian custom officer at New York, and expects to receive a definite statement regarding the latter matter before he leaves Ottawa.

Counsel representing the railways and the Winnipeg Board of Trade have also arrived here. Mr. Isaac Pittblado representing the latter body opposing the application. The general opinion expressed is that the arguments presented before the railway commission will all be concluded this week, as members of the government houses made other engagements for next week, but Mr. Oliver states that the premier has promised him all the time necessary, and he expects to get it.

Await Consideration. The opinion is expressed in some circles that the outcome of the discussion will be that the whole question will be referred back to the railway commission for further consideration, possibly with a recommendation of a favorable nature, as the sentiment among officials of the Canadian National is understood to be that as far as that road is concerned it would not be seriously prejudiced if the mountain scale were removed.

Claims Cincinnati Reds No Chance For Top Place

Observer Points Out Team Bungled Hopes, Although Kept in Dangerous Position by the Defeating of New York.

New York, Aug. 7.—No matter what the Cincinnati Reds do now they cannot take first place away from the Giants on the latter's present western trip. They had a fair chance, but they bungled it with brain power than rank. It is mighty seldom that the Giant is fooled in their gray matter, and any team that tries to beat them with a bludgeon and let its brains remain inactive will never get any further in the parade than in the division of those who also walked.

Cincinnati must beat New York individually and not in a vicarious sense by having other teams thump the champions.

If just a moment is taken to analyze the National League race it will be observed that it has been the ability of Cincinnati to beat New York that has kept the Reds in a threatening position. They have not done so well against other teams.

Take the Phillies. The Giants have won 17 games from them and Cincinnati 13. Each team has lost two to Philadelphia. Even there is Brooklyn. The Giants and the Reds each won eight games from the Dodgers, but Cincinnati lost eight games to them and the Giants only five. Pass to St. Louis. Each team has won eight games from the Cardinals, but the Giants have lost only three to them, while the Reds have lost seven.

Consider Pittsburgh, and this is real consideration, because Pittsburgh, the Giants and the Reds have been in the deadly triangle of wipeout. The Giants have won nine and lost seven playing the Pirates, and the Reds have won six and lost eight. If that ratio stays put for the remainder of the season the Pirates might defeat the Reds for the championship almost single-handed.

FRANCE BEGINS THE EXPLOITATION OF RUHR MINES

New Policy Inaugurated Practically Means All Pits Confiscated.

FIX PUNISHMENTS Germans Ordered To Operate Coke Ovens Under Threat of Expulsion From Homes.

By HIRSH K. MODERWELL, Special Cable to The London Advertiser and Chicago Daily News, Copyright. Berlin, Aug. 7.—The French now are beginning an entirely new policy in the Ruhr—they are attempting to direct the exploitation of the Ruhr mines and factories.

No Attempt to Exploit. Hitherto the French have made absolutely no attempt to exploit the Ruhr. Their seizures of coal, coke and money is no more exploitation than it would be exploiting a farm if a creditor cut down fruit trees and sold the live stock. French seizures of coal and coke while the mines virtually have ceased production during the last seven months yielded France and Belgium roughly one-fourth of the quantity of fuel which was received for reparations in a similar period last year. But many signs indicate that the Ruhr stocks of fuel virtually are exhausted. Shipments the last ten days, according to the French press, averaged 1,800 tons daily, compared with nearly 50,000 tons two months ago.

General Degout's recent order number 57 declares all mines confiscated in principle.

It places the inter-allied commission as the supreme administrative body, managing them and declares any available goods may be seized in payment of the coal tax which the Germans refuse. These orders are regarded here as a preliminary to a general attempt to exploit the mines and coke ovens.

Since the French have seized several, including the Harpenner Works at Dorthfield and the Recklinghausen mine, No. 1.

German workers have been ordered to operate coke ovens for the French, which they refused. The French fixed a list of punishments for those refusing to work and intimidated that they might expel the miners with their wives and babies from their homes and also expel them from the Ruhr territory entirely. These provisions are so sweeping and vague that it now can be said that no industrial workman in the whole Ruhr district will be sure in the morning that he will not be thrown out of his house before night.

May Be Imprisoned. Imprisonment for five years may be inflicted for a comparatively trivial offence. These appear to be those "sanctions under consideration" which Poincaré mentioned in his recent published note, in which he refused to submit, as all unionized miners in reoccupied mines have hitherto, then the French may be obliged to import their own coal. This must be a slow, painful process, even slower than organization of the skeleton service on the railways.

It would appear that the most effective means the French yet have used for breaking resistance of the Ruhr population has been the seizure of coal and coke. They have used this in effect as a starvation measure, for workers without money cannot buy food.

Windsor Lands In Trouble By Acquiring Play Park

Tecumseh Resident Starts Court Action When Revellers Change Into Bathing Suits Out in the Open Air.

Toronto, Aug. 7.—The city of Windsor is having a strenuous time with the acquisition of a little park eight miles from its borders on the shore of Lake St. Clair, in the town of Tecumseh. It already has two law suits upon its hands as a result of a hankering for a little fresh air. A nearby neighbor objects to the proximity of the park, which was opened in the presence of a vast crowd on July 9. So vast was the crowd that it is said that it exceeded the dressing-room accommodation, with the result that many changed into bathing suits and back again under the blue dome of the sky in the open park.

Now Harry C. Kendall has entered action. He sues as a ratepayer for a declaration that Windsor has no power under the municipal act to go so far afield to acquire a park. Application for an interim injunction will be made in weekly court probably on Thursday next.

British and French Statesmen Meeting Again To Discuss Issues.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Aug. 7.—While little evidence is at hand to indicate the probability of British and French statesmen arriving at an agreement at present on a method of solving the Ruhr and reparations problems, British government spokesmen declared today the situation was not so serious as the week-end press reports and comment had seemed to indicate.

Minister Baldwin and his ministers will meet again in Downing street tomorrow to formulate answers to the French and Belgian unyielding statements of the policy they are carrying out with a view to getting reparations out of the Ruhr district. The cabinet will also decide upon the date for publication of allied correspondence covering the period of the last three months.

The Japanese opinion on the note Great Britain had planned to send to the Germans as an allied answer to the German reparations communication has been received by the foreign office. The opinion expressed in the general agreement with the British proposals.

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LEE FOHL RELEASED. St. Louis, Aug. 7.—Lee Fohl has been released as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals. It was announced today. In a telegram to his secretary, B. Von Weise, Phil Ball, owner of the Browns, stated Fohl's dismissal was for the good of the game and the morals of the players.

THINK MRS. MALLORY WILL HAVE HARD FIGHT

Tennis Fans Believe Defeats Will Affect U. S. Woman Champion.

New York, Aug. 7.—Tennis aficionados have found the going so rough during the current sport season, that it might be expected for general reasons, that Mrs. Helen Mallory will have the handicap of at least a mental hazard when she defends her tennis title at Forest Hills next week.

The game of the American champion in early season European tournaments demonstrated more the fact that she would have more to bother her than the realization that this year has no respect for champions. She was defeated in the first round by the foreign stars that her reign as the leader of the American game was thought to have reached the end and the expert began to hunt around for a new champion.

Miss Helen Wille, the 17-year-old Californian girl, has been a prospective champion for three years and the only question has been how soon her day will arrive. She was considered the favorite to win the ranking player of England, and Mrs. Geraldine Beamish, both of whom had defeated the American champion.
