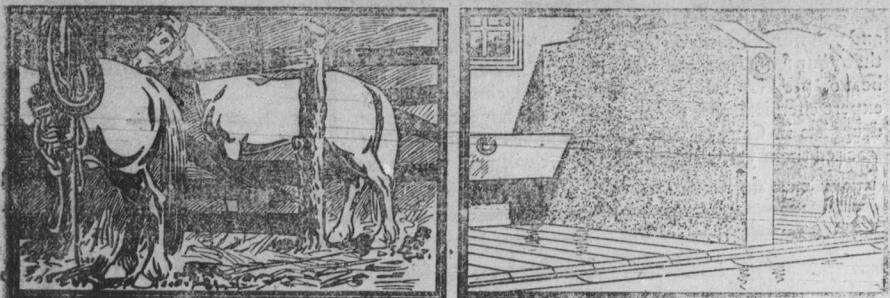

## NEW LOBSTER REGULATIONS

Laths on all Portions Must be One and a Quarter Inches Apart.

Ottawa, Dec. 27.—An order in council has been passed declaring that: All lobster traps constructed after the 31st of December, 1910, shall have the laths on all portions thereof not less than one and a quarter inches apart, and this space must remain clear and nothing shall be done to diminish it, and any netting that may be used in traps shall have meshes of not less than three inches extension measurement, and nothing shall be done to practically diminish the size of the mesh.

No one shall fish for lobsters with traps made after the said date, which are not constructed in accordance with these requirements, but all lobster traps constructed before the said date may be used for catching of lobsters without being remodelled to meet the requirements until the 31st of December 1912 after which date no one shall fish for lobsters with traps which are not constructed in accordance with the requirements first above described in this subsection.

The burden of proof that any lobster trap used from the 1st of January 1911, to the 31st of December 1912 that has not clear spaces between the laths of one and a quarter inches and any netting that may be used in the ends thereof less than three inches extension measurement, was constructed before the 31st of December 1910, shall lie on the person using such traps.

## 700 CANADIAN SOLDIERS AT CORONATION

The work of organizing the contingent to represent Canada at the coronation will be commenced early this month. The first move will be the appointment as commandant Col. H. H. MacLean, member of parliament for Queens-Sunbury, New Brunswick. Various corps throughout Canada will be assigned a certain number of places among the seven hundred available on the continent, and they will be allowed to name men whom they think should be sent to London to represent them. Canada pays the bill to Liverpool and back. Britain pays the rest.

## LUMBER CUT WILL BE LARGE

Conditions for Lumbering Restigouche Have Been Very Favorable.

The Lumber cut in the Restigouche and its tributaries this season will be as large as last season, if not slightly larger. This was the information given the Graphic by a well known lumberman.

At the beginning of the season it was expected there would be some curtailment in the quantity but conditions for chopping and yarding have been so favorable on the North Shore that many jobbers had their contracts filled early in the season. The weather here has been good. Snow fell early in sufficient quantities to make good hauling and staid, dispute the two soft spells which removed the snow in other parts of the province.

Recently one of the largest operators on the Restigouche instructed his foreman and jobbers to cut larger additional quantities than at first ordered. It is said this firm's extra cut will be about ten millions which added to their first estimate will make an exceedingly heavy cut. It is understood that other Restigouche firms are over cutting their first estimates.

In cedar the cut will be smaller than usual as the price of shingles continues to be low.

## CHARGED WITH BURNING SCHOOL

Three More Arrests in Arson Case at Port Greville, N. S.

Amherst, N. S., Dec. 30.—Three arrests were made yesterday at Port Greville in connection with the burning of the school at that place last year and caused a great sensation. A few weeks ago detectives sent to Port Greville to investigate the origin of the fire laid information against Charles Allan on a charge of arson and Allan was subsequently arrested and placed in Amherst jail. Allan has been remanded from time to time awaiting further developments. The men now arrested are from Fox River, the school section adjoining Port Greville. They are, Charles Cochran, Charles Morris and Benjamin Canning, and all three have hitherto borne excellent characters. Cochran is a leading lumberman and shipbuilder at that place and the others are equally well connected. They were remanded one week for trial and bail was fixed at \$2,000. The greatest excitement prevails at Port Greville over the arrests and the bitterness of the school struggle is becoming more furious every day.
