Three Indians Arrested on their Reservations for a Dastardly Attempt to Wreck G. T. R. Train.

G. T. R. Policeman Spence returned to the city last night at 11 o'clock, after an absence of three or four days, during which time he made three important arrests on the Tynecanaga Indian reservation near Mill point, in the county of Hastings.
