NATIVES MUST ESTABLISH THEIR

OWN FORM OF GOVERNMENT. The U. S. Senate Unanimous On This Point-Planed Or Finished Lumber To Go On the Free List - The Sugar

Long Speeches the Rule. WASHINGTON, May 31 .- In the Senate the question of the policy of the United States towards the Hawaiian Islands was definitely and clearly announced by the nanimous vote to-day in the adoption of a resolution reported from the Committee on Foreign Relations declaring that it belongs wholly to the people of those islands to establish and maintain their own form of government and domestic policy; that the United States ought not in any way to interfere therewith, and that any intervention in political affairs of those islands by any other government would be regarded as an act unfriendly to the United

Planed Lumber To Be Free.

The Tariff bill was then taken up, and within the next hour the four paragraph in the lumber schedules were disposed of. The first of the four, fixing duties on lumber, planed or finished, was by a vote of 35 to 24 struck out of the bill, so that such lumber may be put upon the tree list when that stage of the bill is reached. The duty on chair cane, or reeds, was increased from seven per cent. (as in the House bill) to 10 per cent., and the other duties in the schedule were left as in the House bill. The Sugar Schedule.

The sugar schedule having been reached, a three-hour speech on the whole question of the Tariff bill was made by Mr. Sherman (Rep., Ohio), and Mr. Dolph (Rep., Ore.) addressed the Senate at great length on the subject of punishing for contempt of the Senate the newspaper correspondents who had refused to answer certain questions of the committee investigating the connection of the sugar trust with sugar schedule. No conclusion was reached when the Senate adjourned.

"The resolution passed by the Senate this morning in relation to the Hawaiian Government," said a member of the Foreign Relations Committee, "is couched in diplomatic language, but means a great deal. It is an admonition that this government has cast about that little Government the moral protection of its flag, and that any effort on the part of other powers to interfere will be an act we will not stand.
