Port Arthur, Nov. 18.—The steamer Huronic, of the Northern Navigation company, came into port at noon today after having weathered one of the roughest trips in her history. From the time of leaving the Soo the big Sarnia boat has been tossed about.

Induced By Fraud to Sign the Check

Judgment for \$5,000 has been given by Mr. Justice Riddell to Mrs. Lucy Stacey, of Markham, widow of James Stacey, in her suit against Frank D. Mil-ler, hotelkeeper of Stouffville, nephew of the deceased. The Standard Bank was a

the deceased. The Standard Bank was a co-defendant.

The Judge finds that the deceased was induced by fraud to sign a blank cheque, "it being represented that it was for a small sum, and that as a loan," also that the deceased did not thoroughly appreciate the effect of what he did, being subject to periods of clouded mind.

"I am glad," said the judge, "that there is nothing in the law to prevent me rectifying this wretched fraud."

He enters judgment for the plaintiff with a declaration that the money in the bank is her property, and orders the defendant to pay the costs.

James Stacey was about 85 years of age. On the 13th May 1907, he signed a cheque in blank, upon the Standard Bank, Markham, which the defendant Frank Miller afterward filled in tor \$5,000 and presented at the bank. Miller drew \$500, received a marked cheque for \$2,500, and deposited the remainder \$2000, to an account in the bank. A few days after, on the 21st May, James Stacey brought an action against Miller for \$5,000, and against the Standard Bank to prevent them from parting with the money still in their possession. He died May 30, leaving his wife Lucy executrix, who continued the action.
