A NOVEL BOOK DISPLAY.

Cadioux & Derome, retail book sellers, Notre Dame St. west, Montreal, have among the finest and most novel window displays of books in the country. Mr. E. Daoust, of the firm, has incorporated some of the best Parisian book displays as a result of his recent European trip.

One of the new ideas is the display of part of the contents of new fiction in glass cases at the two entrances to the store. Upon the stone pillar between the two front windows is also a glass case used for the same purpose. The window displays proper have books upon a half circle row of fixtures, six deep. These special fixtures are large enough to allow good sized books to be displayed. A good feature of all displays is the pricing of every book which is plainly marked.
