HOME NEWS.

London, May 15.—The Canadian cricketers arrived at Glasgow yesterday—all well.

The work on the new Legislative buildings, Fredericton, is to be proceeded with at once.

A number of ornamental trees have been planted in front of St. Paul's Church, Halifax.

During one day last week twenty-four millions feet of lumber passed down through the Grenville Canal.

It is understood that the British American Bank Note Company contemplate erecting a handsome building in Ottawa.

Ottawa, May 15.—The Quebec Reform Club has decided to entertain the Hon. Mr. Blake at a banquet in that city early in June.

Ottawa, May 15.—The name of the Hon. Sydney Smith is mentioned in connection with the Senatorship vacant by the death of Senator Brown.

Barque "Martha," Herrickson, from Liverpool, G. B., with a cargo of salt for Halifax, is reported ashore at Harrigan's Cove, East Halifax.

St. John, N. B., May 16.—The number of men of the various corps in New Brunswick, to be drilled this year, has been reduced from 1,550 to 1,500.

The Canadian Gazette contains the appointment of Sir A. T. Galt as High Commissioner in London, and of Mr. Lawrence Vankoughout to be Deputy of the Supt. General of Indian Affairs.

Ottawa, May 15.—About 50 men in McLaren's Mill, New Edinburgh, struck yesterday for higher wages. They have been earning one dollar per day, and now demand \$1.25.

Ottawa, May 15.—300 emigrants arrived yesterday afternoon via the St. Lawrence & Ottawa Railway. They are all Englishmen. The last Manitoba party which numbered 59 when it left here, numbered 220 by the time it arrived at Winnipeg.

The Railway bridge at Woodstock is in such danger from the pressure of ice that the authorities have taken up the rails and are transferring freight and passengers by teams over the bridge.

A young man, named Little, while fishing at one of the lakes in the vicinity of Margarets Bay Sunday morning, fell off the rocks and was drowned. Little was a cooper by trade and leaves a wife and five children.

The Amherst Boot and Shoe Company seems to be prospering. The annual report is about to be made, and will show an increase in sales from \$65,000 to \$84,000 for the year. The Company now gives employment to about 65 hands.

The St. Croix Cotton Mill Company has finally been organized, and the following Board of Directors chosen: James Murchie, Charles H. Eaton, Charles F. Todd, James H. Ganong, L. G. Downes, Charles H. Clerke, G. M. Wentworth, John D. Chipman, W. W. Graham.

Montreal, May 15.—The death of Lady Hincks, causes profound sorrow in Montreal among her large circle of friends. Her remains will be taken to Toronto this afternoon. Lady Hincks was born in India in 1811, and was married to the Hon. Justice Sullivan who died 1853. She married Sir Francis in 1875.

H. M. S. "Northampton" the flagship of Vice-Admiral Sir Leopold McClintock, arrived in Halifax Harbor on Saturday. She is one of the strongest and most heavily armored of England's mightiest ships of war, and is furnished with the Electric light, telephones, and every modern invention calculated to increase the fighting qualities of the ship, and the comfort of her officers and crew.

NEWS FROM ABROAD.

London, May 15.—A despatch from Yokohama says Japan has declined a Russian alliance.

Paris, May 15. The strike riots, which extended to Lille and Rheims, have been suppressed.

Abdurrahman Khan has not yet accepted conditional offer Amership of Afghanistan.

The Edinburgh Scotman's London correspondent learns that the Government

intends to remove restrictions to native ports of India.

Naples, May 14.—The Queen and Crown Prince of Italy arrived here today and were received with extraordinary enthusiasm by the populace.

Mr. John Marley, the journalist and author, formerly editor of the Fortnightly Review, will be the editor of the Pall Mall Gazette.

Lord Beaconsfield will not for the present resign the leadership of his party, as has been reported, but will lead the Opposition, at all events during the present year.

The Anchor line have decided to establish a regular fortnightly steamer communication between London and Halifax. The first—the "Anglia"—sail on Wednesday.

St. Petersburg, May 16. Among the Jews ordered to leave here is a citizen of the United States. It is proposed to liberate 200 political prisoners in St. Petersburg, and 400 throughout the Empire, and to relieve 11,000 persons from surveillance.

Berlin, May 14.—When all the new formations planned and worked out in their minutest details by the German War ministry, are completed, the total strength of the army will exceed two million men.

It is reported in Bermuda that Major-General Sir Robert Laffan, Lieutenant-Governor of the Colony, and Commander of the Forces, will shortly leave for England, and that Col. Gordon, commanding the Royal Engineers, will be appointed his successor.

President Hayes and his cabinet and the Governor General of Canada will be invited to attend the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the settlement of Boston, to take place on the 17th of September next. The city appropriated \$25,000 for the celebration.
