AM ENGLISH CONFESSION. - Now I am going to tell you someteing that may, cause a smile to ripple un-der the skin of honest John's cheek, but ultimately might settle down into a grin of ghastly import with him. The publication of the report of the Defences Commission has infused new ardour for invasion throughout France. The military and clergy are known generally to favor it; and the legitimists see in it a more extended horizon for changes to suit them. The war cry has long been unceasingly heard in etho to the noisy boasting of preparation in England, but not encouraged. It is now the theme of journals, the topic in saloons, and the clamour in cases. The report admits the impossibility of coast defence; and it remains, therefore, as a question to start with, where would the descent be most successfully accomplished? And here comes my piece of startling intelligence, to which the official ear of asinine capacity, is especially invited. Ireland is to be honoured with the prospect of the invading squa-dron, some very bright morning at early dawn. A flag of truce will be held out to her, and the Imperial visitor will assure her of his conciliatory motives at once in these terms:—"I come with no hostile purposes to you, Catholic brothers of Ireland. I have no design to annex your Island as a province to France but you have a taskmaster in England, whose tyranny over you has made you the object of compassion through centuries and throughout the world. I come to your rescue, and having humbled your enemies and claimed for you common rights, I shall return, feeling that I have conferred a benefit on mankind." Granting a preference for British annexation, would not a voice like this arouse castaved Erin to remind her of her chains? This is no imaginary reverie but is cherished here more especially by readers of La Question Irlandoise, and of Mgr. Dupanloup's recent pamphlet The principle of such intervention, and a precedent before our eyes, is presented in Sicily.-Liverpool Northern Press.

Napoleonic Designs on England .- A discovery has recently been made which has excited a great sensation in the limited circle in which the facts are known. We allude to the circumstance of a chart of London, drawn up in obedience to the Imperial behests, having fallen into the hands of a gallan: admiral, in which all the leading banking establishments, jewellers, and other places containing valuable property, are distinctly marked out for spolia-tion, in the event of a French invading army succeeded in reaching the metropolis. In conjunction with this chart of London, another drawing has been found, indicating the very place where the French intended to land, with papers pointing out their contemplated plan of procedure. We are as-sured that the Napoleonic intention was—we think it likely it has been abandoned by this time-to land 50,000 men at that part of the coast indicated, and with them to march to London, taking the place, but instead of a permanent occupation, coudescendingly limiting their stay in the British capital to three days-a time which Louis Napoleon deems sufficient for the purposes of plunder, and also for the humiliation of England. We believe we are correctly informed when we say, that the facts we have mentioned have been communicated to Lord Palmerston, and that noble ford has deemed them of sufficient gravity to lay them before his colloagues in office. We will only add that the gallant admiral into whose hands the plans and papers in question accidentally fell, is a near relative of one of our leading metropolitan members, and that it was on the suggestion of the latter that the information was given to Lord Palmerston, and that the charts and documents were placed in his lordship's hands .- Morning Advertiser.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT IN THE CHANNEL FLERT .-On Saturday week a serious accident from crinoline took place on the deck of the Roya. Albert, one of the Channel squadron now anchored in the Frith of Forth. While the vessel was througed with visitors the dress of a lady, which was much extended by an amplitude of crinoline, in passing one of the signal guns, caught the percussion hammer and brought it over up on the fuse. The gun, which was loaded with blank cartridge, vent off, and one of the crew, who unfortunately was standing in front of the gun, had his arm blown off close to the shoulder.

Mr. Harrison was opposed to the provision taxing batchelors. There was a tax already laid upon a goiso, and any man who had lived 25 years without being married could be taxed under that section." The bill was postponed.
