Above All Else.

Determination of Presbytern Ministers to Uphold the Protestant Nature of the Present Manitoba Public School System.

The Free Press of Thursday, 15th November, in its report of the Proceedings at the Presbyterian Synod, said:

"Rev. Dr. King gave notice of a motion that the synod deems it seasonable and important to affirm its satisfaction with the fact that unsectarian system of education has been instituted in the province of Manitoba, and that the synod would deprecate any change in the present system of operation which would forbtd the use of the Scriptures at the opening or closing of the school when the trustees so desire.'

In accordance with the above notice. the report of the Synod's doings on this subject is reported by the same paper,
