Mr. Lloyd R. POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT

DIFFICULTIES ARISING FROM REVISED PAYMENT PROCEDURES

Mr. Harold E. Winch (Vancouver East): Mr. Speaker, I wish to address an important domestic question to the Postmaster General. What action is being taken by his department to correct the situation whereby many employees in Vancouver and other post offices are not receiving their proper cheques, with some reported to be behind in salary payments to the extent of hundreds of dollars? I ask this question in view of the impact of this situation on the morale of our post office employees.

Hon. Eric W. Kierans (Minister of Communications): As is known, Mr. Speaker, the government has recently changed its system of salary payments from twice a month to once every two weeks. This has occasioned some difficulty to some employees of the government, because though now they receive more cheques they find that each individual cheque is somewhat smaller in amount, and there have been some cases, mainly in Vancouver, where the cheques have been delayed. I can assure hon. members however that this is being looked after, and that it is of immediate concern to all of us.

CALGARY, ALTA-DISCUSSIONS ON CONTINENTAL POLICY

Mr. Eldon M. Woolliams (Calgary North): Mr. Speaker, I would like to welcome the Prime Minister back from sunny Alberta and trust he enjoyed his skiing on the slopes. I would like to put this question to him in reference to petroleum—

Mr. Douglas Stewart (Okanagan-Kootenay): On a point of clarification, Mr. Speaker, I would like to advise the hon. member that it was on the slopes of Okanagan-Kootenay, on the Bugaboos Mountain.

Mr. Woolliams: Well, Mr. Speaker, I do not want to get into an argument with my good friends from British Columbia, but I did understand that the Prime Minister did a little skiing on his way back in those places that count in Alberta, and I would like to put this question to him in reference to the petroleum industry.

Did the Prime Minister in Calgary meet privately with representatives of the petroleum industry to discuss the consequences of his talks with President Nixon or to receive formally the views of the representatives of the petroleum industry about a new national and North American continental oil and natural gas policy?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Yes, Mr. Speaker, I did meet privately with some of the representatives of the oil industry of western Canada, and we had general talks about the industry and its future.

Mr. Woolliams: In reference to the dialogue which he had with the President of the United
