### PAKISTAN—REQUESTED RESTORATION OF DEMOCRACY

**Mr. Dan Heap (Spadina):** Madam Speaker, I rise on an urgent and pressing matter under the provisions of Standing Order 43. As the Prime Minister (Mr. Trudeau) and the Government know, President Mohammad Zia-Ul-Haq has ruled Pakistan for five years by martial law. His Government has been accused by Amnesty International of massive violations of human rights, including arbitrary arrests, floggings and execution of political opponents. I therefore move, seconded by the Hon. Member for Saskatoon East (Mr. Ogle):

That the Prime Minister ask President Mohammad Zia-Ul-Haq during his visit in Canada to end martial law in Pakistan, to release all political prisoners and to restore democratic elections and an independent judiciary as requested in a petition by over 400 Canadians, which I will now send to the Prime Minister.
