be a warehouse in Toronto! If that is the kind of economy he wants to build, that is not what we want!

## REQUEST FOR ADJUSTMENT AND EARLY RETIREMENT PROGRAMS

Hon. Jean Lapierre (Shefford): Mr. Speaker, in advertising paid for by the Government of Canada with taxpayers' money, the Government offers assistance to victims of free trade.

What I am asking the Minister is: What else has he to offer these 131 unemployed workers? Having a warehouse in Toronto will not feed their families next week.

I want to know from the Minister where the adjustment programs are. Where are the early retirement programs? What is he offering these families, instead of stupid answers like those he has given us since yesterday?

It is not suggested by the company that it has any connection, and the hon. gentleman deliberately distorted the facts when he brought that up. No amount of subterfuge can conceal the fact that you do not wish to tell the truth. You are following your Leader. You do not want to tell the truth.

## GRAPE GROWING INDUSTRY

Mr. Steven W. Langdon (Essex—Windsor): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister for International Trade who spoke against a closure motion in 1981 when he was not a Minister. In the course of that speech against closure he said:

"Where are the people with the grapes in their district? They do not care what happens to the grape industry—"

The European Community laid a complaint before GATT that our provincial liquor board practices with reference to liquor and wine were unfair and discriminated against those competing from outside.
