fo univerfally admired, by all who have had the pleasure of seeing them: I afterwards got it corrected by a Spanish Friend.

I have added, to the Map of California by Don Miguel Costanso, the Engineer on this Expedition, some Views of the Coast, from a French MS Voyage in my possession, and have joined, to compleat the Knowledge of the Parts berein mentioned, a Plate containing a Plan of San Francisco, different from that I formerly published, with a Chart of part of the West Coast of California from a Spanish MS; and on the same Plate I have given a Plan and View of the Balle de Bandera, from the same French Voyage.

As this MS frequently refers to Cabrera-Bueno, I have therefore translated that Author's Description of the Coast of California; as I thought it would be acceptable to the Publick, it was published in a Treatise of Navigation, printed at Manila, 1734, for it is in many Places very obscure, and extremely ill-pointed, which encreases that obscurity; I have rendered it as nearly literal as possible: and I have added the Translation of a part of the French Voyage abovementioned.

I shall conclude with my acknowledgments to D'Robertson for His Present, and to Mr. Revely for the favour He did me in translating It: The First Steps of a New-Establishment are always curious.
