Lowering of Customs Would Be Injurious to All Canadian



KINGSTON, Nov. 16 .- (Special.)-The board of trade, by a unanimous vote, passed a resolution against reciprecity in trade between Canada and the United States. The members are convinced that lowering of the Canadian customs would be injurious to all Canadian interests. They believe that the tariff must be so framed as to encourage investment of Canadian capital in Canadian enterprises, and to transfer to workshops here the manufacture of goods which we now im-port from other countries, principally from the States. While tariffs should te primarily framed for Canadian in-terests, it should give preference to the mother country, and to any other part of the British Empire, with which reciprocal preferential trade can be arminimum tariff must afford adequate The board of trade will petition the minister of railways and canals to have the necessary steps taken to preserve the Rideau Canal as a waterway and that necessary improvements be


