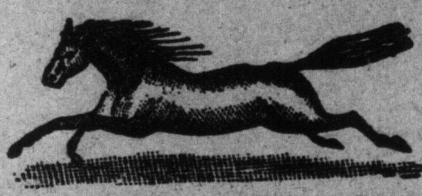

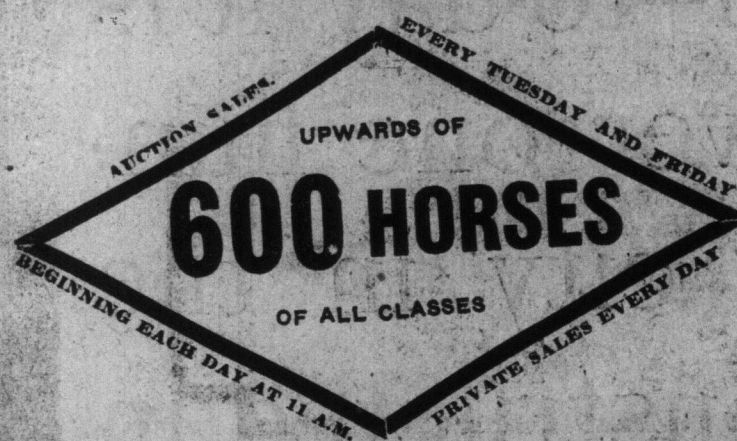

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## HARRY HILL TAKES PAGE IN STRAIGHT HEATS

While Directnell Also Wins in Straights—Good Sport at Dufferin Matinee.

One of the most successful opening matinees ever held at Dufferin Park was given yesterday under the auspices of the Dufferin Driving Club. Early in the day it did not look as if it would be possible to hold the meeting, but as the day progressed, the sun shone, and with the west wind blowing, by 2.30 the track was in very fair condition, and the first race was called by Starter Patterson.

The audience was good, but not as large as expected, and the first race was called by Starter Patterson.

The first race called was the trot, when five good trotters lined up. Shaun Rhue drew the pole, Directnell second position, Eddie Stewart third, Alex Atkinson fourth, and Norma Lee on the outside. With very little delay they were away to a good start. Before the quarter pole was reached Shaun Rhue and Directnell were racing like a pair. They raced this way to the stretch, with the others well out, but Directnell seemed to have the foot of the party and won quite handsily, with Shaun Rhue a good second and Eddie Stewart third. Time 1:16.

The second heat was not quite as fast, but was also won by Directnell, with Shaun Rhue second. Directnell was very steady and seemed to be a lot of speed.

The third and final heat was finished in the same order, but was a faster heat of the race—1:14.

The second race was for Class C pacers, and had six starters. Major Direct drew the pole. They were some time in getting away, but when they started, they gave the word they were all on their own. Major Direct seemed to have it on his field in this heat, with a won quite handsily, with No Trouble second, and the gentle Harry Lee third. Time 1:54.

In the second heat, Major Direct led well into the stretch, but one of the wheels of his axle gave out, and Lady Medium came on with a great burst of speed and topped him at the wire. Time 1:54.

Lady Medium was the third heat, with Major Direct second and Smutt third. Time 1:54.

The fourth heat was a dead heat between Lady Medium and Major Direct, with Smutt in third place. Time 1:14.

The fifth and final heat was won by Smutt right at the wire. Lady Medium seemed to have the heat won, but the driver of Smutt did not let up and just nudged the mare out at the wire. Time 1:14.

The races were contested on the five-hoop plan and purses divided according to summary. The Class A (heavy) were the last to race, and four classy side-wheels responded. Collingwood Rooker (2114), Harry Hill (2164), Sidney Mack (2154), and Capt. White (2044).

The race was very close in getting them away. The race seemed to be between Collingwood Rooker and Sidney Mack, but John Mack, with Harry Hill, was riding, and when they entered the race he came on and just nudged out Collingwood Rooker for first place. Time 1:06—pretty fast time for so early in the season.

The second heat was also won by Harry Hill, with Sidney Mack second. Time 1:14.

The third heat was won by Harry Hill first, Sidney Mack second, Collingwood Rooker third. Time 1:14.

The run was close in getting them away. Eight horses paraded, and they certainly looked fine, the looks all in their silks, making a very creditable showing. It was won quite handsily by Sally Savage, John Canisell second, and Embleton third. This was the completion of a very fine afternoon's sport. 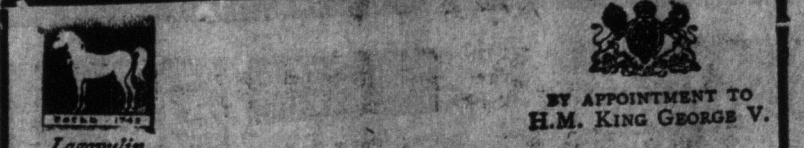
**HORSE ENTRIES ARE IN CLASSES WELL FILLED.**

Entries for the National Horse Show are now pretty well in and have been entered up according to class. While, of course, in one of the entries are a little bit deficient as compared with former years, in the majority of classes they are in excess. Amateur numbers are not what might be called numerous in the respective classes, but still they are satisfactory. It has to be borne in mind that in previous years the amateur or Cornishian classes have been dropped, while this year they are revived. As a result the divided entry is not as large. Still in the aggregate the entries are the most numerous ever received. One class has no fewer than thirty-eight, which means that preliminary trials will have to be held in the morning.

There is going to be a very keen competition indeed for the King Edward Cup, especially between the Hon. Adam Beck and Mr. J. S. Dixon, both of whom have won the trophy twice, and who in winning it this year will become the actual possessors. Mr. Yeager and others propose to put up a severe fight for the valuable trophy, and the military classes, also, while promising interesting competition, might have a very close finish. Still, even in these, the aggregate is greater than in previous years, and especially spectator contests are to be looked for.

The boxes have been pretty well taken up, but applications continue to be received. The reserved seat plan will not open until Thursday, April 20, at the Ryer's Booths, 7 East King street. While it is the intention of several exhibitors to send the horses that will be shown here to the big Olympia Exhibition, their performances and success at the races will largely determine whether they will cross the water or not. Already several exhibitors have been advised by Mr. Stark of the intention of merchants to enter for the window dressing competition, and some of the downtown stores promise to present an exceptionally attractive appearance during the horse show period.
