COMMONS DEBATE

WHEAT BOARD

see our wheat ground in Canada. One way to accomplish this would be to so control ocean tonnage that four would not be discriminated against in favor of the barge by ocean freight rates.

Donald Rutherford of South Oxford, Mr. Sexton of East Peterboro, and others complained of the adulterated and poisonous mill feed which was being sold to the farmers.

Mr. Malloy (Provencher), complained that the government had closed the market when the price of wheat was going up. The excuse was that the consumer had to be protected, but he did not believe that the cost of flour cut any figure in the high cost of living.

Complaint of the People.

The complaint of the people of Canada is not against the farmer, but against the high cost of living, due to the middleman and the profiteer.

This was the declaration of W. F. Maclean (South York), who intervened tonight in a somewhat acrimonious debate in the house of commons between city and country members over high prices for farm products and the effort of the board of commerce to reduce the same.

Mr. Maclean took the position that a board or court of some kind was necessary if only to give publicity to profiteering. He only regretted that the government in this country did not enforce the federal law as did the national government in United States. The bill before the house was for the control of the middleman, and furnished the occasion for some severe attacks on the board by Messrs. G. H. Glass and Sexton. The particular ruling they complained of was one fixing the price of milk, which the government claims has been rescinded. In this connection Mr. Maclean pointed out that the farmer received seven cents a quart for the milk, but the consumer had to pay fourteen cents. He believed it would be found that all along the line the profiteering was done by the middleman.

After several hours' debate, was finally passed without division.

COMMERCE BOARD

GETS LABOR LEADER

James Murdock, Toronto, Takes the Place of F. A. Acland.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—Labor will be represented on the Dominion Board of Commerce. Official announcement was made tonight that James Murdock of Toronto was today appointed a member of the board to take the place temporarily filled by F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor. The official announcement says, in part:

"Mr. Murdock has for many years been an outstanding figure in Canadian labor circles. He took a prominent part in establishing the Canadian Railway Adjustment Board in 1918, which did so much to ensure and maintain harmony and co-operation as between railway companies and their employees. For a year past he has strongly held the view that the cost of living should be controlled, and, if possible, reduced, and that increasing wages only would never solve our labor problems."

"For the past fourteen years Mr. Murdock has been an officer of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, and during most of that time the chief executive. He is a resident of Toronto."

stated that, unless the newspapers change their attitude towards the railway strikers, the newspaper composers would strike.

It was announced by the government tonight that unemployment allowances would be paid to workers thrown out of employment thru the railway strike.

A development of the railway strike was an order by the secretary of the Vehicle Workers' Organization, instructing its members not to touch any railway work of any description in connection with the movement of food or otherwise.

The transport men's representatives in their visit to the ministry of labor, had an interview with Sir David Shackleton, permanent secretary of the ministry.

A meeting of all branches of the transport federation, has been called for tomorrow. The executive body of the transport men will confer tonight with the committee of the National Union of Railwaymen. A meeting of the Bus Men and Cab Men's Union will also be held this evening.
