L. L. P. SLOGAN IS FIFTY THOUSAND

Walter Rollo Sends Out a Call For Fifty Thousand Members.

Fifty thousand members by spring. This is the slogan of the Independent Labor Party, and one which has been messaged abroad by the leader of the party, Harry Rollo. This was the information given out at the Labor meeting held last night at the "Tops" which was addressed by W. A. Douglass of the Single Tax Association; Mrs. Hector Prenter, Tom Black and William Stephenson, campaign organizer for the party in Toronto. The meeting was well attended and enthusiastic.

Tom Black ventured the opinion that a doctor who prescribed an operation for appendicitis when the patient had fever was nothing less than a criminal at large. The same might be said of some bankers. The whole fact of the matter was that nationalization of the professions was the only means of bringing such scoundrels to book. Finally, after asking why reforms already in vogue in Australia could not be inaugurated in Canada instead of waiting fifteen years, the speaker paid his usual tribute to the press.

Mrs. Hector Prenter with emphasis pointed out that the L. L. P. stood for justice for the people. Let all be thankful, she said, that the workers had a party which had it in its power to deliver them from the hideous miseries suffered so long. In a strong message to the workers she warned those present from aligning themselves with two classes: those who were so cold as to be hypocritical, and those who were so wild and woolly as to be fanatics, in other words, revolutionists. "I am essentially a revolutionist," said the speaker, "let us fight our war, not with blood, for God knows we have shed enough already, but with brains and ballots."

Both Mrs. Prenter and Mr. Douglass made reference to the coming municipal elections, and Mr. Douglass emphasized the need of the workers sending a deputation to the board of control when the recommendations of the assessment committee were to be considered. "There is really no housing problem in Toronto," said Mrs. Prenter. "The whole problem is one of taxation. So long as we are not represented in the city hall chambers just so long will the assessment committee remain without its champions among city fathers."

WELL, WHAT NEXT?

PROHIBITION BILLS
PASS IN COMMONS

perance act be enforced, and then, except for medicinal, industrial and sacramental purposes, the importation will cease.

Hon. V. L. Mackenzie King described the measure as "humbug," being neither provincial nor federal. A better designation would have been "hybrid." It is a combination of provincial and federal action, and a shieling of responsibility of both federal and provincial administrations back to the people, but in this prohibition of the dried fruit can be secured by any province that desires it. For a time it removes the prohibition issue from the federal house to the deep regret of the professional political prohibitionists.

Senate's Action Doubtful.

There is no definite knowledge of what the senate will do. Many senators have left the capital, although most of them have paired in this question. If the Quebec conservative representation votes solidly against the measures they will be defeated. The vote may be very close. The bills will be discussed in senate committee, moved in and parliament will prorogue tomorrow afternoon.

Supply voted during the afternoon and evening totalling over sixty-three million dollars. The big item was forty million dollars to carry out the reclamation of soldiers' committee. It was decided to enlarge purpose of this response so that it will apply to any soldier in need of assistance. The next largest item was twenty millions for soldiers' land settlement.

At the morning sitting the house on a division of 57 to 28 concurred in the senate amendment to the Grand Trunk bill providing that the award of the arbitrators must not yield more than five millions per annum to the shareholders in dividends. Later in the day the fifty thousand dollars to cover the cost of the arbitration proceedings was voted.

Withdraw Railway Bill.

A bill to amend the railway act by striking out the clause to bring under the jurisdiction of the railway commission local steam or electric railways which are operated by a company having a federal charter, met with much opposition from both sides of the house. On the motion to go in to committee, Frank Cahill, Pontiac, moved in amendment that the legislation be referred to the railway committee. The amendment was lost. Mr. Cahill submitted that the railway employees should be heard in this matter.

H. B. Morphy opposed the government measure. Men were used to a standardized equipment on the large railroads, and when they went on to these smaller roads their lives and limbs were endangered because the appliances and equipment were different. G. B. Nicholson also opposed the removal of the clause.

Hon. C. J. Doherty said there was opposition to the clause because it was too wide in its character.

The bill was finally withdrawn by the government.

Pass Prohibition Bill.

Hon. C. J. Doherty's amendment to the act in aid of provincial legislation prohibiting the sale or use of intoxicating liquors, was then given the second reading. The bill prohibits the manufacture, sale or use of liquor when it is known or intended that such liquor will be used in violation of the law of the province in which it is manufactured. The amendment was lost.
