RECOMMENDS MINERS TO GET BACK TO WORK

Secretary Acland Advises Cobalt Strikers to Call Out Conciliation Board.

COBALT, July 18.—(Special.)—The La Rose mine last night was announced as having closed down for two months, but to-day a small force is at work.

At Cobalt Lake there are thirty-seven men working who do not belong to the union, and over forty at the Coniagas and twenty at the Trethewey.

At the O'Brien, seventy men are at work and one drill running.

Superintendent Houston, at the Right Key mine, is leaving the mine to make a tour of the island, but is looking for some carpenters.

The Townsville has a full force at work, and Nipissing is also working.

At the McKinley-Darragh union, wages are being paid, and a nine-hour shift adopted. The superintendent, Capt. Harris, had a rather stormy interview with President McGuire to-day when the latter went down to see why a blacksmith, who applied for work, was not taken on. He was told it was because he was not wanted. The mine takes men on whether they are union or non-union. The strikers' union contract expiring in September, remain at work at contract wages. Superintendent Reader is leaving the McKinley at the end of the month.

A new find was made on this property to-day near the railway cut. The vein has not been worked at all, but where found is about 6 inches wide and rich in silver.

Despite the strike, the shipments for the first seven days of July amounted to over 575 tons, and to-day the Silver Leaf has sent out its initial shipment of one car of thirty tons of high-grade ore. The Hudson Bay has sent another carload, and the Queen-to-day shipped forty tons to Copper Cliff. The Comagans is sending out ore steadily, having shipped four cars already this week. The shipments to Thursday night for this week amount to over 500 tons.

The contents of a letter from Secretary of Labor Acland to James McGuire, president of the union, dated to-day, have been made public. Mr. Acland recommends the union to return to work and call in the offices of the board of conciliation, to whom the sub-board under dispute could be referred. Frank Burr Mosure.

Body of Infant in Lake. The body of a new-born girl was seen floating in the lake by Sgt. George Tuft of Stanley barracks while he was routing off Garrison Common at five o'clock yesterday afternoon. With the aid of P. C. Norton the body was taken from the water and removed to the morgue, where an inquest will likely be held by Coroner Johnson, who is investigating.

Not His Wheel. Detective Twigg arrested Ernest Erskin of Alton, Ont., as he was selling a wheel at the Planet Bicycle works on East Queen-street. Enquiries were made and the man is now held for the Brampton police charged with the theft of the wheel.

RAINS CAUSE RIVER FLOODS LIFE AND PROPERTY LOSS

Towns Partly Submerged and Railway Lines Damaged—Several Fatalities.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 18.—The loss of several lives and great monetary damage has resulted from heavy rains throughout Western Pennsylvania, Eastern Ohio and West Virginia during the last 24 hours. The rivers and mountain streams are out of their banks, live stock have been drowned, bridges and buildings washed away, railroad tracks swept off or undermined, trolley systems demoralized, electric light plants and communication lines cut, and hundreds of families compelled to abandon their homes and take refuge on higher ground.

About this city the rivers have risen over six feet in ten hours. Reports from above the city say that recurring storms during the past 48 hours have resulted in a precipitation of from 3 to 4 inches, which, being at the head waters, when they reach this city, may cause some damage unlooked for at this time of the year.

The interior of West Virginia has sustained heavy damage. Miles of trackage of the Western Maryland, and the coal and iron railroads in Lucre and Barbour counties have been washed away. The service on these roads is said to be at a standstill. The Dry Fork and Baltimore & Ohio railroads are under water for many miles, and no trains can be operated. In the Tygart's valley, the towns of Grafton, Rowlesburg and Tunnelton are almost submerged. The property damage amounting to nearly a quarter of a million dollars.

At McCombs, W. Va., the home of Mrs. Mary Ballard was wrecked by the high water, and three young children of Mrs. Ballard were drowned. The bodies were washed away.

Lives Lost. A special to The News from Grafton, W. Va., says that from three to five lives have been lost and half a million dollars damage sustained during the passage of the river. The loss of life was at Grafton and Tunnelton. Among the dead are Claudius Wolfe of Evansville and Frank Gibbons of Newburg.

Damage by Cloudburst. CLARKSBURG, W. Va., July 18.—More than half a million dollars damage resulted from cloudbursts, storms and floods last night at Newburg, and along the Cheat River valley in Frederick County and this vicinity.

Houses were washed away, the main line of the Baltimore and Ohio, and telephone wires are all down. Much damage has been done to property along the Monongahela river. At Newburg, Kingwood and Evansville.

The sudden rise in the Monongahela River wrecked the bridge between Grafton and McCombs, Pa., and Charlestown. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

IGNORE NEW RATE LAW SENT TO THE CHAIN GANG

Stiff Punishment Meted Two Prominent Officials of Southern Railway.

ASHEVILLE, N.C., July 18.—James H. Wood, district passenger agent, and J. C. Wilson, of the Southern Railway, who were arrested yesterday, were to-day found guilty in the police court of selling passenger tickets in disregard of the new rate law, and each sentenced to 30 days in the chain gang. Mr. Wood is a member of the board of aldermen of this city.

Little doubt is felt that some way will be found to save Wood and Wilson from serving this sentence.

Injunction Dissolved. The interim injunction granted by Mr. Justice Huddell to A. H. Cooper, restraining Atkinson Bros. from publishing certain posters, was dissolved by Mr. Justice Huddell yesterday morning. The plaintiffs claimed to have a copyright in a series known as the "Land of the Maple," in which the maple leaf appeared very conspicuously. They allege that in using the maple leaf as they were doing for their own cards the defendants were infringing the copyright. The court held that no damage was inflicted on the plaintiffs by removing the injunction, as an account would be kept of the sales, and if the pending action was decided in favor of the plaintiffs they would be able to recover damages and claim an accounting.

NEW YORK'S FIRE DEPT. WILL COST CITY \$10,000,000

NEW YORK, July 18.—Francis J. Lantry, fire commissioner, announced that the budget for his department for the coming year will approximate \$10,000,000, as against an appropriation of \$6,700,000 for the current year.

Most of the increase will go for the installation of paid departments on Long Island and Staten Island, ten companies in Manhattan and the Bronx, seven companies in Brooklyn and Queens and five companies in Richmond.

There will be needed \$200,000 to pay for the increase in the salaries of first year firemen—that is, those of the fourth grade, when appointed. Commissioner Lantry endeavored to have a bill passed in the legislature increasing the pay of fourth grade firemen from \$800 to \$1000, but it was unnecessary, as the board of estimate, it has been declared, has the right to grant the increase, and Commissioner Lantry hopes to get it.

BARTELS' FORTUNE GOES.

Has Lost \$300,000 Since Arrest, His Son Declares.

Herman Bartels, Jr., of Syracuse, N. Y., had an interview in Toronto yesterday with his father, Herman Bartels, who has been sentenced to 90 days in jail for escaping from the custody of the police at Osgoode Hall.

The younger Bartels stated that he would never rest until someone had been brought to book in connection with the case. He said his father was a millionaire and over some time ago, but his arrest and imprisonment had cost him \$300,000, through the depreciation of his securities. What means he had left would be used to see justice done.

MAGWATT IS O.D.G.M. GRAND LODGE OFFICERS

Masons at Ottawa Conclude Their Session—Niagara Falls Next.

OTTAWA, July 18.—At 2 o'clock this morning it was announced that A. T. Freed, Hamilton, was elected grand master unanimously, and was presented by Hugh Murray at the grand representative of Washington Lodge, Buffalo, with a handsome bouquet.

There was no election in the contest for the deputy grand master, none of the three candidates obtaining a majority. One thousand and thirty-three votes were cast, Judge D. F. MacWatt being elected with 470, Aubrey White of Toronto 405, and Shaw of Kingston 158. The latter retired and the votes will be divided between MacWatt and White. Later in the day, Judge MacWatt was elected.

J. R. Reid, Ottawa, was elected grand secretary, and E. T. Malone, Hamilton, was chosen grand junior warden by 533 out of 1042 votes cast.

E. T. Malone, Toronto, was re-elected grand treasurer, and Hugh Murray, Hamilton, grand secretary.

There was no election on the first ballot for the position of grand registrar, and J. H. McKinnon withdrew. R. H. Hull was elected on the next ballot.

The following were elected by the board of general purposes: George S. May, Ottawa; A. F. Webster, Toronto; R. L. Gunn, Hamilton; J. A. McPadden, Toronto, and J. H. Plock, K.C., London. Appointed by Grand Master R. L. Gunn, Hamilton: Aubrey White, Toronto; D. B. Simpson, Bowmanville; J. A. McPadden, Toronto; Stewart McWhiter, Petrolia; W. J. Drope, Grimsby.

H. Ritchie of Streetsville was elected grand chaplain.

Niagara Falls was under wind on the next place of meeting, by a large vote.

On motion of R. L. Gunn of Hamilton, and E. T. Malone, a resolution was unanimously passed protesting against the inconvenience caused by the failure to provide the proper facilities for handling the certificates and tickets of members.

J. K. Bryden's motion to increase the representation of grand lodge was snuffed under.

KILLED IN LAND SLIDE.

Teamster Buried in Pit, Dies in the Hospital.

James Swan, 84 Belmont-street, a teamster, died in Grace Hospital yesterday of injuries received in a cave-in of a sandbank near Bloor and Christie-streets yesterday morning. An inquest will be held at the hospital at 10 o'clock this morning by Coroner McConnell.

Swan was filling his wagon in the sandpit when an undermined bank fell upon him, crushing him beneath its weight and burying him. His skull was fractured and both jawbones were broken. He was also cut about the head and his right leg was broken. He died about an hour after his removal to the hospital.
