GEN. WHITE'S DEFEAT HAS REPEASED THE ENEMY

There Was Desperate Fighting at Ladysmith All Day Saturday—Wagon Hill Retaken by the British Three Times and Finally Held.

Boer Losses Greatly Exceeded Those of the Defending Forces—List of Casualties Not Yet Given Out By the War Office—How Buller Met His Defeat at the Tugela River—Full Story Now Given—25,000 More Troops for South Africa—Latest Bulletins.

The Boer forces investing the long-leagued Ladysmith have apparently done their worst to make General White capitulate, but General White stands before the British public to-day a hero. His message to the War Office says the enemy attacked Caesar's Camp and Wagon Hill in great strength, and with the greatest courage and energy on Saturday. Some of the British entrenchments on Wagon Hill were three times taken by the enemy and retaken by the Imperial forces. The attack was continued until 7.30 p.m. on Saturday. One point in the British position was occupied by the enemy all day. But at dusk in a very heavy rain storm they were turned out of this position at the point of the bayonet in the most gallant manner by the Devonshires, led by Col. Park.

Mr. A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Treasury, delivered a most reassuring speech to his Manchester constituents last night. He gave as an explanation why the Government did not protest against the increased armaments of the Transvaal that the Jameson raid gave the Transvaal a chance to say that it was not aiming for aggression, but for self-protection. Thus the Government were now being criticized for doing too little by those who a year ago said the Government were doing too much.

Jameson Raid to Blame. "It is true," he continued, "that the Government knew the situation contained elements of peril; but it is not true that they regarded the war as anything like inevitable. If it had been believed that the Government, knowing the Transvaal was increasing its armaments, did not protest, the melancholy reason rests in the Jameson raid, which gave the Transvaal a chance to say it was aiming not for aggression but for self-protection. Thus we are criticized for doing too little by those who a year ago criticized us for doing too much."

British Artillery Weak. Lord Dufferin, in The Times this morning, returns to his arraignment of the War Office for the inferiority of British artillery.
