PEEL RIFLEMEN AT LONG BRANCH.

Good Shooting Weather and some Creditable Scores Made.

The 9th Peel Regiment held their annual rifle match Thursday afternoon at the Long Branch rifle ranges. The weather was perfect, the light good and the wind favorable. While the number who competed was not large, owing to the fact that the rifle ranges are very inconveniently situated for the majority of the members, many of whom live at a distance, there was very creditable shooting done. It must be remembered that the members of this regiment have not got the advantage of practice as have the city regiments, and this is the first rifle match in which they have used the new rifle.

The ranges in the general match were 200, 400, 500 and 600 yards, with seven shots at each range, making a possible of 48 points.

The prize list was not large, the 30th Regiment has no pot-hunters, and each man received a prize. They will be present at the review before the Duke and Duchess, and as each member is looking forward to the occasion with the greatest enthusiasm the officers expect the ranks will be full to a man.

They Stayed in a Branch.

Between 200 and 300 harvesters reached the Union Station yesterday by special train from Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, where they have been for the past two months reaping the grain crop. WEST END ENTHUSIASTIC.

Parkdale Preparations for Royal Visit—Politics and Personalities.

A letter from Capt. Blumhagen, adjutant of the 14th Regiment, Kingston, has been received by Mr. Turnbull Smith, announcing that the regiment will arrive in Toronto at midnight on Oct. 8 for the royal review. Of this regiment, 20 of the officers have secured quarters at the Gladstone House, West Queen-street. There is a general expression of hearty gratification that the royal procession is to pass along West Queen-street. The "Parkdale" merchants are, in consequence, arranging for a meeting to decide on a general scheme of appropriate decorations, which promise to be profuse and handsome. The West End Y.M.C.A. will hold its evening program of the evening. The building will be open for inspection. The increase in membership for September has been almost double that of last September.

An Artistic Masterpiece.

A love scene with the characters in picturesque Watteau costume and a party of musical amateurs, clad in the costume of the time of Louis XV, and all enthusiastically engaged in playing string quartet: these are the two subjects, which are treated most exquisitely in oils on the Holstman piano, which is being exhibited in the windows of Messrs. Goulay, Winter & Leeming, 125 Yonge-street, and is being examined by a large number of people. The case of the instrument is of a rich, dark, San Domingo Mahogany, and the manner in which the artist has worked the vanishing points of his picture, so that they almost insensibly blend and then disappear into the natural tones of the mahogany, is a marvel of skill.

This beautiful method of treatment (in oils) is not new in the art circles of Europe, and has been extensively adopted of recent years by some of the most eminent American makers, but it is believed that this is the first time that a piano has been so decorated in Canada. It is appropriate that it should be a Gerhard Holstman piano, for such a beautiful case only appears seemingly when enclosing an instrument of superlative musical quality.

MANCHESTER SETTLES.

\$25,000 Needed to Pay Creditors Provided By His Mother.

London, Sept. 27.—The World correspondent learns that the composition fixed by the Bankruptcy Court on the Duke of Manchester's debts was paid today. The \$25,000 necessary was provided, not by the Duke's father-in-law, Eugene Zimmernan, but by the Duke's mother, the Dowager Duchess of Manchester, the transaction being carried out by Mr. Holland, now here, the partner of the Dowager Duchess' late brother, Ferdinand Xanadu. It was because of the hopelessness of trying to induce Mr. Zimmernan to put up the necessary money that the Duke's mother went to the rescue in order that the women of Toronto, it was decided that a public invitation to subscribe be made in the newspapers to all women in Toronto.

New Steamer "Lake Manitoba."

The splendid new steamer, "Lake Manitoba," 11,500 tons, twin screws, Bligh keel, will sail on her first voyage from Montreal for Liverpool at daybreak Friday, Oct. 11.

The Lake Manitoba is the latest addition to the Beaver line fleet, and has been specially constructed by the eminent ship-building firm of Messrs. Swan & Hunter of Wallsend-on-Tyne for the freight and passenger service between Montreal and Liverpool. Her dimensions are: Length, 268 feet 4 inches; beam, 56 feet; depth, 34 feet 9 inches.

The saloon staterooms are situated on the promenade and saloon decks, amidships, where the least motion is felt, and are large, light and well ventilated. The splendid saloon, extending the full width of the vessel, will seat at one time all of the first cabin passengers. There are also a large music room and library, and a commodious smoking room, both situated on the promenade deck.

The second cabin accommodation is situated on the main deck, and includes a large dining saloon, music room, ladies' room and smoking room. All of the staterooms are of either two or four berths.

There is excellent accommodation also for third-class or steerage passengers, and special efforts have been made to secure the comfort and convenience of this class of travelers.

The steamer has been designed with a view of securing the greatest possible steadiness at sea, so as to reduce seasickness to a minimum. It is lighted throughout with electricity, and has electric bells in every room.

Mrs. Pullman's Alimony.

Chicago, Sept. 27.—Judge Bishop today granted a decree of divorce to Mrs. Lynn Pullman from George M. Pullman, son of the late palace car magnate. Alimony was fixed at \$1000 a year, and the plaintiff was granted permission to apply for an increase in alimony and for attorneys' fees later. Mr. Pullman, who is now in California, let the suit go by default.

Along the Waterfront.

The steamers are doing a big business in handling freight. They are bringing in daily big quantities of fruit from the fruit-growing districts. The Lakeside yesterday brought over about 7000 baskets from St. Catharines. The Corona and Chipewagon from Niagara and A. J. Tynon from Jordan also arrived with big cargoes of grapes, apples, etc.

The Ocean cleared from Geddes' Wharf for Hamilton yesterday. She will return here to-day, and this afternoon leave for Montreal.

About 300 people left for the east yesterday on the R. & O. steamer Toronto. They were bound for Montreal, Quebec and the Saguenay.

The steamer Kingston will leave for the east at 3.30 this afternoon on her regular trip. A large number have been booked for this trip.

Gales Damaged Orchards.

Clifford Express: Thousands of dollars' worth of apples were blown from the trees in orchards throughout the western section of Ontario by the gales which blew on Sunday and Monday. The loss will be felt severely by farmers, who all had a short crop as it was. Apples were selling in the orchards as much as 25c per barrel. The trees were not entirely stripped in every instance, but probably none escaped altogether. Fall apples suffered more than the winter varieties. The result will be to flood the evaporators with work. Apples are much too scarce to be allowed to remain where they fall until picked up by the live stock, and the evaporators are taking the place, almost entirely, of the old system of drying fruit in the farm-house kitchens.

The work of decorating Osbourne Hall in honor of the Royal party's visit has commenced. The building will be outlined with incandescent lights.
