Legal advice was that the complaint against the company must go before the Grand Jury for investigation, and that only the case against Sise could be tried before the magistrates. It was not intended to abandon the prosecution against the company, however, until the obnoxious contract has been declared illegal or has been abrogated. Therefore, those interested in the details of the prosecution met as soon as court adjourned to talk over this feature.

It was agreed that no matter what the decision of the magistrates may be concerning President Sise, the Grand Jury investigation will be forced as against the Bell Company. Messrs Hoover White, Johnston and other leading citizens discussed this phaseof the case at length and mentioned it to the Crown Attorney, Col. Farewell said the Grand Jury would convene March 16. Mr. Hoover said he would consult with Secretary Donald Beaton of the rural company and call a meeting at once for the purpose of arranging this second fight.

It was the sense of the gathering that the same fight should be taken into the York County Grand Jury and, in fact to encourage every County in Ontario to begin prosecutions along the same line. The theory is that if the contract is a violation it remains a violation unil declared no longer in effect. The legal advice is that it is not necessary to prove that the contract was made in this or that country, but merely to prove that, because of this contract, and in pursuance its provisions, trade has been interrupted and restrained.

It is necessary, however, that application be made for a telephonic connection with a depot in good faith, and a refusal received, based upon this contract. Any county into which the line or lines extend that may be refused a connection, counsel advises, may proceed against the company or its president criminally. It is believed the whole country can be aroused by these methods to the unfair-ness and outrageous discrimination of this contract, which has been made public thru this fight.
