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BOY TAKEN FROM MOTHER AND MADE WARD OF CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY ON FATHER'S REQUEST

Ottawa Man Traces Son to This City and Succeeds in Having Him Taken From Mother for Causes Which He Presents to Court.

Armed with a letter of introduction from Secretary John Keene of the Children's Aid Society, Ottawa, Joseph Di Filippo waited upon Inspector Joseph Sanders of the local Children's Aid Society a couple of days ago. Di Filippo was in quest of a lost boy otherwise his small son, Tustano Di Filippo, aged 8 years. The father understood the lad was somewhere in London with his mother, but had no particular desire to get the boy from her guardianship. He didn't think it was in the best interests of the boy to be with his mother. On February 22 last, after living with Di Filippo nine years, the woman left for parts unknown with a man known by the name of Rocco, taking along the little boy. They came west.

Traced to City. They were traced to this city and to York street, where they have been living.

Secretary Keene of the Ottawa Children's Aid Society wrote that Di Filippo was a man of some means, was anxious to get the boy back, would undertake to send him to a boarding school, and intended to do the best thing by him.

It was found that Rocco, the woman and boy were living at 53 York street. The aid society inspector went to the place and found the boy.

The mother of the boy was summoned to the police court. After a thorough investigation of both sides of the story, it was decided to make little Tustano a ward of the children's aid society, the father expressing his desire that this should be done. In the meantime he will be cared for at Mount St. Joseph's.

ANTHRACITE COAL IN CAMP MUST BE BUT SPARINGLY BURNED

Camp Orders are Strict in Defining Uses.

Camp orders today say: Anthracite coal must not be burned in any military building in London, other than hospitals, except in jacket heaters. One of chestnut anthracite coal per jacket heater per month will be issued on indent on the barracks officer, and quartermasters must not draw in excess of this amount. It has been pointed out that in some cases large quantities of chestnut coal have been drawn for jacket heaters and then used for other purposes. This practice must cease.

REV. BYRON SNELL TO STAY FOR FOURTH TERM

Byron Snell, the pastor, to remain pastor of that church for a fourth year. The usual term is three years. The members commented on the excellent work being done among the congregation by Mr. Snell. NORWEGIAN LEGATION HAS LEFT
Christiania, Dec. 12.—The Norwegian legation has left Christiania, according to the Aftenposten. The newspaper reports also that Denmark, the last of the neutral countries to continue relations with the Bolshevik Government, is about to sever them.

Word Received by Her Brother, Dr. Ross Thomas, From Chicago.

Dr. Ross Thomas, Queen's avenue, received word this morning that his sister, Mrs. Lester Walker of Oak Park, Chicago, had died of influenza.

Mrs. Walker was brought up in this city and educated at the London Collegiate Institute and later graduated from the Western University. She was very musical and for some time sang in the Ridout Street Methodist Church, of which she was a valued member, always taking a keen interest and active part in the church affairs. Mrs. Walker was also secretary of the Ruth Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, until the time of her marriage about a year and a half ago, when she left with her husband to reside in Chicago.

The body will be brought to this city for interment.

She is survived by her father, who resides on Princess avenue, and three brothers: Dr. Ross Thomas of this city, Whit and Bert.

PTE. C. PUGH IN ENGLAND.
Pte. Cecil Pugh, 321099, who was taken prisoner on October 1 and has since been in Germany, has been released, according to a cablegram received by his brother, William Pugh, 278 Hampton road. The cablegram was from the Canadian Red Cross. Pte. Pugh enlisted in the W. O. R. and left with a draft from that unit from Bramford in April last. Previous to enlistment he was employed as a cigar-maker.

COURT OF INQUIRY.
Courts of inquiry are scheduled to inquire into the escape of Pte. Fred J. Lorette from escort at Chatham, while being brought from Windsor to London and to investigate the cause of the death of Pte. Spencer Robertson while on farm furlough at Mount Forest on October 22.

DESERTER CAUGHT WHILE WAITING TO RECEIVE HIS MONEY

Telegraph Clerk Proved To Be Dominion Constable.

MAN HAS HAD CAREER

Has Left Units and Been Captured at Least Three Times.

The varied experiences of a deserter were told The Advertiser today by Capt. Asa K. Minard, chief of the Dominion police. He said that a man, some time ago, was arrested as a deserter in Detroit. He was then turned over to the military authorities at London, who discovered upon his arrival that he was already a deserter from the 12th Battalion. The records showed that he had deserted in July, 1916. He was given over to the W. O. R. and had been in training a short time when he again took flight. He was again located. This time the Dominion police constables found him in Bois Blanc (Boob-Loo) Island. He was arrested and taken to London, and because of his being a deserter on more occasions than one he was turned over to the civil police and tried by Magistrate Graydon, who handed him out a sentence of three months.

Put in Draft. He served not more than two months of his sentence when he was released and put in a draft for overseas. Drullard was now closer to having a conference with the army than he had before, so he only had a short time to act if he wanted to once again give the army the slip. He did not do it, but he did not stay in one place long enough for the constables to catch him. They soon found out, however, that his resting places consisted of three places, namely, Waterloo, Guelph and Galt. He decided that his home in Windsor would be much safer, but he was "broke." Home is the usual place to go for help when one is in need, and Drullard's case was no exception.

Wired Home For Money. He wired home for \$10 from the Galt branch of the C. N. W. Telegraph. He kept in constant touch with his home, and at last he decided to try his luck as a deserter. He called the agent answered in the negative. The Dominion police constable was called to the office and the next time Drullard called upon the constable he was arrested. Drullard stated that it was there. Drullard was taken to the police station and a ticket for London, and said to forward the money on to the London office.

Wired the Police. The constable immediately notified Capt. Minard of the Dominion police at London to the effect that Drullard would arrive in London on the Grand Trunk about 5:40 o'clock, but in the meantime things were arranged by the Dominion police to catch him. Drullard was taken to the police station and a ticket for London, and said to forward the money on to the London office.

The transportation conditions everywhere, it was reported, are becoming more nearly normal, as a result of the cessation of war shipping.

JAIL GOVERNORS ASK FOR SALARY INCREASES

Deputation Wait Upon Hon. W. D. McPherson Today.

Toronto, Dec. 12.—This morning a deputation from the Ontario Association of Jail Governors, headed by President James Ogilvie, of Hamilton, waited on Hon. W. D. McPherson, in the Parliament buildings to ask for increased salaries and better working conditions. A minimum of \$12,000 a year was asked. Some governors have perquisites of house and fuel, others not. The need of more turnkeys was pointed out. Mr. McPherson promised consideration of their requests.

BELGIUM'S LOANS INCREASED.

Washington, Dec. 12.—Belgium's loans by the United States were increased today to \$231,200,000 by an additional credit of \$3,200,000. Credits now authorized for all the Allies amount to \$5,223,540,702.

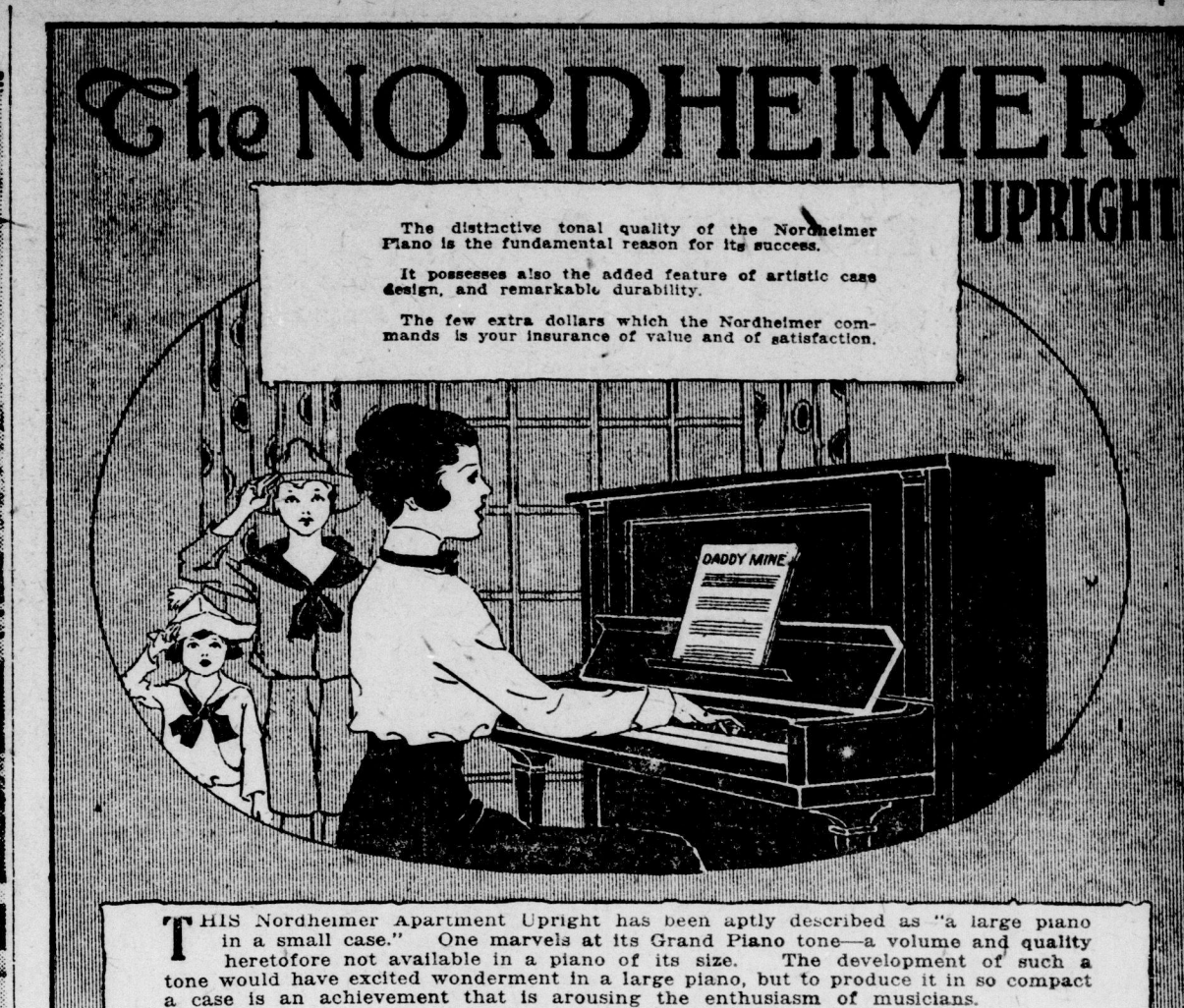
