

FREE CANADIAN WHEAT

Are Hostile To · Unrestricted Trading At the Present

Winnipeg, July 12 .- Strong opposition to the opening of the Canadian markets for unrestricted trading in wheat, in view of all the circumstances surround Ing the business in Canada, and in view of the action of the United States Gov ernment, was voiced in a resolution adopted by the Canadian Council of Agriculture at its final session last night, under the chairmanship of H. W

Wood, president.
The council called upon the government to without delay create a body similar to the United States Grain Corporation, with like powers and functions, and with the financial accommodation adequate to its operations.
