

GREEKS SCORE VICTORY OVER THE TURKS

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QUEEN OF THE AIR APPROACHING HOME PORT

ALMOST ENTIRE BRITISH PRESS AGAINST THE BRINGING OF EX-KAISER TO THE CAPITAL

Trial of Count Hohenzollern in England May Be Abandoned Owing To Widespread Opposition.

London, July 12.—Predictions that the project to bring the former German emperor to trial in England will be abandoned are growing in view of the almost unanimous opposition of the newspapers of all parties. Virtually all the leading papers, with the exception of the Northcliffe press, which has taken no stand, are denouncing the proposal.

OTTOMAN FORCES NEAR SMYRNA DRIVEN BACK BY THE GREEKS

Turks in Retreat Massacre Greek Women and Children.

Saloniki, July 12.—The Greek army operating south of Smyrna, in Asia Minor, is driving the Turkish forces there rapidly backward, forcing them to abandon guns in their flight, according to a statement issued by Greek army headquarters here. The Turks left the bodies of more than eight Greek women and children in a mutilated condition behind them, the communique declares.

ALLIES TODAY LIFT BLOCKADE AGAINST HUNS

Announcement Is Made By the Council of Five.

Paris, July 11.—By the Associated Press.—The council of five has decided to raise the blockade against Germany tomorrow. It was announced tonight. Official documents setting forth the ratification of the peace treaty by the German National Assembly at Weimar, reached the French foreign office today. Legal experts of the council will immediately begin an examination of the documents, and the reports of the legal experts will be under consideration by the council of five today. The decision to lift the blockade indicates that the scrupulous establishment that the document was satisfactory.

TO START IMPORTING AT ONCE.
Berlin, July 11.—In connection with the imminent raising of the blockade, it is stated that importation of necessities, such as foodstuffs and clothing, will be made quite freely, but the cabinet intends to admit luxuries and raw materials only to the extent thought advantageous from the economic viewpoint.

As individual firms lack credit facilities, the cabinet takes the standpoint that import syndicates must be formed and that these should be authorized by the government to participate in their direction.

GREAT BRITAIN ABOUT TO SEND CONSULS TO CITIES OF LATE FOE

London, July 12.—Great Britain is preparing to resume her consular service in Germany soon and to give every facility for British firms to distribute goods there, says the Daily Mail. A special committee of the foreign office is selecting men for consular work, and it is expected that the ambassador to Germany will be appointed in the near future.

It is expected that Germany will send a charge d'affaires here, but that no German ambassador will be named for some time. Travel to Germany will be restricted, the newspaper says, but bona fide commercial travelers will be given facilities to go anywhere they desire.

NEW PASSENGER LINE, MONTREAL TO FRANCE

Montreal, July 11.—Direct passenger traffic between Montreal and France is likely to be established shortly by the Compagnie Canadienne Trans-Atlantique, which announces that their two boats, the S.S. California and the S.S. Hudson, both sailing on the 9th of August for Havre, will offer second-class improved staterooms and stateroom accommodation. So far this company, which in Canada is represented by the Canada Steamship Lines, and in France by the Compagnie Generale Trans-Atlantique, has only dispatched freight vessels since the inauguration of its service between Montreal and Havre at the opening of this season.

The Big Issue

Denver, Colo., July 12.—With a declaration that the "high cost of living, the high cost of dying, the high cost of justice, and the outrageously high cost of everything, is the paramount issue in the world today," the convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen late yesterday adopted a resolution urging immediate establishment of municipal markets and cold storage houses to deal in necessities and thereby to eliminate the profits of the "middleman." The resolution attacked the big packers, alleging control of food products.

Temperance Forces Call Mass Meetings All Over Province

TORONTO, July 11.—Mass meetings in every part of the province will be part of the campaign for prohibition, conducted by the Ontario Temperance Society. The committee, with its central and sub-committee working throughout the province, has its plans for a systematic canvass of the electors practically presented, and Dr. A. S. Grant stated today that the province-wide canvass of the electors in some districts commences in about a week.

FLU WIPES OUT ALL NATIVES OF ALASKAN TOWN

San Francisco, July 12.—Confirmation of reports that the native Indian population of Bristol Bay, Alaska, virtually was wiped out by an epidemic of influenza, was brought here yesterday with the return of the United States cruiser Marblehead, from a relief expedition to the north.

According to Lieut. W. R. Leahy, senior medical officer of the expedition, 95 per cent of a population of more than 200 persons had died by the time the expedition reached Bristol Bay.

COUNCIL OF AGRICULTURE NOT TO BE REPRESENTED AT LIBERAL CONVENTION

WINNIPEG, July 11.—No representative of the Canadian Council of Agriculture will be sent to the National Liberal convention at Ottawa in August, it was decided this morning after a lengthy discussion on the matter. The invitation was given full consideration and practically the whole morning was devoted to the discussion. The fact that farmers' organizations have never been connected with any political party was given as the reason for declining the invitation.

BLAZE IN WINNIPEG CITY DOES \$150,000 DAMAGE

WINNIPEG, July 11.—Late this afternoon a fire, which is believed originated in the polishing shop, destroyed the building occupied by the Hilsen Auction Company, causing a loss estimated at \$150,000, partially covered by insurance. The building was used for many years as the Granite curling rink, and its destruction marks the passing of an historic landmark. It was of frame construction and burned rapidly.

ENGINE CREW KILLED WHEN TRAIN DITCHES

Quebec, July 12.—By the derailment of the east-bound Maritime Express on the C. N. R. line yesterday, west of La Durantaye, Quebec, Belloc, Engineer J. H. Pelletier and Fireman J. A. Le Clerc, both of Riviere du Loup, were killed, and Mail Conductor Oscar Belanger of Quebec slightly hurt.

EVEN GERMANY 'GETS' PROFITEERS

Berlin, July 12.—In view of the impending raising of the blockade, the government's recent action in reducing the prices of food staples is forcing food traffickers to get rid of hidden supplies. As a result a sharp decline in prices is reported from all sections of Germany, the most marked decreases being in the Rhenish zone of occupation, where they have fallen from 30 to 60 per cent.

CLOUDY SKIES AND DRIZZLING RAIN MOST DISHEARTENING TO ORANGE MEN ON GORGEOUS 12TH

Still Bands Are Making Music and Regalia Is Prominent On Streets—Ardor of the L. O. L. Not To Be Dampened By Weather.

The lowering skies and rain of today have proved a tremendous disappointment to thousands of members of the Orange Order in the city and surrounding district who for weeks have been anticipating the going of the "Glorious Twelfth" in London.

One of the busiest men in town for days has been Secretary W. J. Hodgins who mournfully remarked this forenoon as he watched the rain beginning to sprinkle, "if it had been the usual fine Twelfth of July weather, we would have had at least 5,000 people in the parade. Now if it clears up by 11 o'clock, this will scare the folks, and the ladies especially can't come out in their light dresses and regalia."

Another disappointment in connection with the rain. For weeks, local Orangemen of the district (and perhaps more especially the "True Blue" ladies) have been looking forward to a rich harvest on Saturday, the Twelfth, from the tag day to be held on behalf of the orphanage to be erected for the children of soldier members of the order who gave their lives in the war.

Bright and early the "True Blue" ladies were out with their boxes and handbags, and practically the whole morning was devoted to the discussion. The fact that farmers' organizations have never been connected with any political party was given as the reason for declining the invitation.

Notwithstanding the showers, however, the bands and members of the reception committee valiantly met all incoming trains, the cheery strains of life and drum and brass instruments extending a heartening welcome. Visiting Orange contingents were escorted to hotels, and every possible arrangement made for their comfort. Thomas Fox, in command of the reception committee, and associated with him are a number of capable assistants.

The Orange regalia in all its variations has been conspicuous on the streets of the city all forenoon, creating much interest, wherever it appeared on the Saturday market.

Parade at One O'Clock.
The parade is due to mobilize at 1 o'clock along King street from Taibot. Mounted on white horses with gorgeous trappings, the directors are E. Langford, county marshal; S. Kearns, deputy marshal, and deputy assistant marshal, A. Nevin.

Bands at the head of them, here and there at intervals up and down the length of the procession, the Orangemen will make music wherever they go. The order for the day call for a parade north on Richmond street to Dundas, and thence to Queen's Park for the "doings" of the day.

The order boasts in its ranks today no less than four "city fathers," including Aldermen W. A. Wilson, John Collins, F. R. Watkinson and E. R. Seabrook.

COURT-MARTIAL TO TRY SOLDIER ON SEVERAL SERIOUS CHARGES ASSEMBLES, BUT IS ADJOURNED

Witnesses Hard To Find and Accused, Pte. Geo. W. Baker, Is Physically Unfit To Appear At Present.

A court-martial with Major F. G. Stanbury of the Canadian Garrison Regiment as president, assembled at the Wolseley Barracks this morning at 9 o'clock, for the purpose of trying Pte. George W. Baker, Canadian Army Service Corps, on three charges, namely, that of stealing a handkerchief, boots and gloves, property of the Government, escaping from confinement and desertion.

However, as several witnesses for the defence who were in the service at the time of the alleged offences and who are now discharged from the army, and owing to the fact that the prisoner is unfit mentally to be tried at present, the court adjourned until Tuesday, July 22, at 9:30 a.m., when it will assemble in Wolseley Barracks.

ALLIES FORCED TO ACT AGAINST RED GOVT. IN HUNGARY

Bela Kun's Communist Methods Going Too Far.

Basle, Switzerland, July 12.—The representatives of the Allies in Vienna have decided that action must be taken against the proceedings of Bela Kun's communist government in Hungary, according to the Neues Tagblatt of Vienna, as quoted in a dispatch from the Austrian capital. A special courier has been sent to Paris to obtain the necessary powers from the allied supreme council, the newspaper declares.

FARMERS OPPOSE FREE CANADIAN WHEAT MARKET

Are Hostile To Unrestricted Trading At The Present Time.

Winnipeg, July 12.—Strong opposition to the opening of the Canadian markets for unrestricted trading in wheat, view all the circumstances surrounding the business in Canada, and in view of the action of the United States Government, was voiced in a resolution adopted by the Canadian Council of Agriculture at its final session last night, under the chairmanship of H. W. Wood, president.

The council called upon the government to without delay create a body similar to the United States Wheat Corporation, with like powers and functions, and with the financial accommodation accorded to its operations.

GOING AT 35 KNOTS.

London, July 12.—The position of the R-34 at 6:30 o'clock a.m., Greenwich Mean Time (2:30 o'clock New York time), was 52 degrees, 15 minutes north latitude and 23 degrees west. The speed of the airship was at that time 35 knots an hour.

ONE ENGINE BREAKS.

LONDON, July 11.—The air ministry has received the following report from Ponta del Gada, Azores: The R-34 at 8:10 p.m. (Greenwich time, 4:10 p.m., New York time) is 4,000 feet above the clouds and, despite a disabled engine, is going strong. We are just about to descend to look at the sea. All well.

LONDON, July 11.—(Reuter.)—Sir Arthur and Lady Currie, who, it is understood the shortly returning to Canada, were received by their majesties at Buckingham Palace today and had the honor of luncheon with the royal family.

MILLION DOLLARS TO BE SPENT ON RUBBER PLANT AT KITCHENER

Canadian Consolidated Company Increasing Its Output.

MONTREAL, July 11.—The Canadian Consolidated Rubber Company, Limited, has decided to spend immediately one million dollars on their plant at Kitchener, Ont., for the purpose of substantially increasing the output of the plant.

SOLDIERS PERISH AS ARMY TRUCK PLUNGES INTO SWOLLEN STREAM

Alexandria, Iowa, July 2.—Two officers and four private soldiers were killed when an army truck en route from Alexandria to Camp Humphrey plunged from a bridge into a swollen creek near here, early this morning. Eighteen men were in the truck, and a number of them are unaccounted for. The officers and enlisted men, all stationed at Camp Humphrey, had been to Alexandria on leave, and were returning to camp. As the truck ran on to the bridge spanning the creek, the driver lost control of the steering gear, broke and the heavy car crashed through the railing into the creek, which had been swollen by recent rain.

FRENCH GUNBOAT CREW TO CELEBRATE BASTILLE DAY AT MONTREAL CITY

Montreal, July 12.—A French gunboat, the La Somme, docked last night at Laurier pier, having come here to enjoy a vacation after a hard spell of duty off the banks of Newfoundland, and at the same time to participate in the celebration in connection with the 14th of July, the commemoration of the fall of the Bastille.

La Somme is a grey-coated oiler with a displacement of 800 tons and a speed of 20 knots, 4,000 horsepower, with two propellers, and is driven by parsons gear turbines. Only one gun now remains forward. She was built in the French Government dockyard at Brest during the war, and went on submarine patrol duty in July two years ago. Lieut. Commandant Lacombe has three officers, one sergeant and one hundred men with him on board.

TWO TORONTO MEN ARE SERIOUSLY INJURED IN HOSPITAL AT HAMILTON

HAMILTON, July 11.—The condition of Leo Mulhall and John Verrall, Toronto men injured when the automobile which Chas. Gallagher, also of Toronto, was driving, was wrecked near Clarkson last evening, is serious.

Both are in St. Joseph's Hospital. Mulhall is suffering from concussion and serious scalp wounds. Verrall has several fractured ribs and internal injuries are feared.

GREEK PAPERS DECLARE BULGARS ARE EVADING ARMISTICE CONDITIONS

Saloniki, July 12.—Alleging that Bulgarians should be compelled to disarm, newspapers here state that the forces now with the Bulgarian colors are approximately three times the size stipulated in the armistice agreement.

GREAT DIRIGIBLE IS NEARING HOME; MAKES GOOD TIME DESPITE A BREAK

Wireless Reports the R-34 About 360 Miles Off Irish Coast Early Today—One Engine Out of Commission.

London, July 12.—The British dirigible R-34, on her return flight from the United States, was approximately 360 miles west of the Irish coast at 11 a.m. (Greenwich meridian time) today, according to a message received by the Wireless Press.

GOING AT 35 KNOTS.
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ONE ENGINE BREAKS.
The R-34 at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, Greenwich time, 10:30 a.m., New York time, had reached 46 degrees, 22 minutes north latitude, 23 degrees, 35 minutes west longitude. One of the airship's engines had completely broken down. The message said it was proposed to land at East Fortune.

POLES FOLLOW CANADA'S LEAD, ENDING TITLES

No Decorations or Titles Save Military or University.

Warsaw, July 12.—The Polish Diet has voted that all titles should be suppressed. In future there will be no decorations except military orders, and no titles except university degrees. No one may wear a foreign decoration without having received special permission from the diet.

TRANSPORT ARAGUAYA WITH WOUNDED DOCKS AT PORTLAND, MAINE

PORTLAND, Maine, July 11.—The transport Araguaya with 760 wounded Canadians, arrived today from Liverpool. Most of the wounded had no cover, but there were some serious cases, including 38 insane. All were taken to a special train to Canadian military hospitals.

NO HARM IN MINISTER POLISHING NURSES' TOENAILS, SAYS JUDGE

Advices Wife and Husband To "Make Up."

NEW YORK, July 11.—So far as Justice Giecher is concerned the Rev. John Martin Neiselt did not cure Carolin Cooper, his daughter's nurse. And Mrs. Neiselt has done nothing extraneous in her conduct as a wife, the justice decided.

He reached his decision today after a trial of evidence in the divorce suit of Mrs. Neiselt for divorce and the minister's counter-suit for reinstatement in his position.

Neiselt's twelve-year-old daughter testified that her father had conducted a "make it up" with Mrs. Neiselt. Neiselt insisted there was nothing out of the way about the operation, inasmuch as the little girl assisted by holding Miss Cooper's ankle.

COBALT MINERS SEEK SOLUTION OF TROUBLES THROUGH LABOR DEPT.

Cobalt, July 11.—The local miners' union executive has telegraphed Senator Gleason Robertson, minister of Labor, asking what progress was expected immediately in the questions at present in dispute between the operators and the employees of the silver camp. No answer to the minister's suggestion that a joint conference be held between the managers and the union has yet been received by the latter from the Mine Managers' Association, and the union executive has asked that something definite be received from the federal authorities in time to lay before the union meeting on Sunday.

Representatives of five mining companies are meeting with the union in the Porcupine camp today.

SUPREME COUNCIL NAMES THE CZECH BOUNDARIES

Paris, July 12.—The supreme council of the Allies yesterday settled the question of the Austro-Czecho-Slovak frontiers in accordance with the recommendations of the commission which investigated the frontiers question. Under the settlement the Czecho-Slovakians are given the benefit of the changes in the regions of Gradenica and Seldberg. The Austro-Hungarian frontiers question is still under consideration. The council today will take up the question of raising the blockade on Russia.

FIRST DUTCH CHAMBER FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Amsterdam, July 12.—The first chamber of the Dutch Parliament has adopted a motion to introduce woman suffrage in Holland. The vote was 94 to 6.
